## KEY FINDINGS

The headline CPI (for all urban areas) annual inflation rate in July 2010 was 3,7%. This rate was 0,5 of a percentage point lower than the corresponding annual rate of 4,2% in June 2010. On average, prices increased by 0,6% between June 2010 and July 2010.

The **food and non-alcoholic beverages** index increased by 0,3% between June 2010 and July 2010. The annual rate increased to 1,4% in July 2010 from 0,7% in June 2010. The monthly increase in the food and non-alcoholic beverages index was largely driven by monthly increases in vegetables (3,8%), meat (0,3%), fish (0,2%) and oils and fats (0,2%). These increases were counteracted by monthly decreases in fruit (-1,4%), hot beverages (-0,6%), milk, eggs and cheese (-0,4%), sugar, sweets and desserts (-0,4%), bread and cereals (-0,3%) and cold beverages (-0,1%).

The **housing and utilities** index increased by 3,0% between June 2010 and July 2010, mainly due to a 16,3% increase in electricity and other fuels and an 8,8% increase in water and other services. The annual rate decreased to 6,4% in July 2010 from 6,7% in June 2010.

The **transport** index decreased by 0,4% between June 2010 and July 2010, mainly due to an 18c/litre decrease in the 95 octane and 15c/litre decrease in the 93 octane price of petrol. The annual rate decreased to 1,1% in July 2010 from 2,2% in June 2010.

The **restaurants and hotels** index decreased by 3,9% between June 2010 and July 2010, mainly due to a 15,4% decrease in accommodation - hotels. Note that the 15,4% decrease excludes educational boarding fees. The annual rate decreased to 6,4% in July 2010 from 11,0% in June 2010.

The **miscellaneous goods and services** index increased by 0,3% between June 2010 and July 2010. The annual rate decreased to 5,8% in July 2010 from 7,4% in June 2010.

The provinces with an annual inflation rate lower or equal to headline inflation were KwaZulu-Natal (2,9%), North West (3,0%), Northern Cape (3,1%), Mpumalanga (3,3%), Eastern Cape (3,4%), Limpopo (3,4%), Free State (3,5%) and Gauteng (3,7%). The province with an annual inflation rate higher than headline inflation was Western Cape (4,0%).

## NOTES

### CPI for August 2010

No surveys in addition to the published surveys will be conducted in August 2010.

### CPI for August 2010

Stats SA will be making an adjustment to the suite of indices published in the CPI each month. Currently Stats SA publishes an extensive set of geographic breakdowns. While the national Headline CPI is by far the most widely used of the CPI indicators, regional breakdowns are sometimes used in legal proceedings and contract adjustments. Our research shows that the provincial CPIs as well as the CPIs for certain primary urban areas (e.g. City of Cape Town, City of Johannesburg) are used for this purpose. The indices for secondary areas (for each province) are seldom used.

As from the August 2010 CPI release (published in September 2010), Stats SA will no longer publish the indices for secondary urban areas for each province individually. Rather, there will be one aggregated index for secondary areas at a national level. This will affect tables 13 - 16 in the Additional tables report. This change will have no negative impact on the robustness or accuracy of the suite of CPI indices including the Headline CPI.



## GLOSSARY

<b>Annual inflation rate</b>	The annual inflation rate is the change in the CPI for all items of the relevant month of the current year compared with the CPI for all items of the same month in the previous year expressed as a percentage.
<b>Annual percentage change</b>	The annual percentage change is the change in the index of the relevant month of the current year compared with the index of the same month in the previous year expressed as a percentage.
<b>Average annual inflation rate</b>	The average annual inflation rate is the change in the average CPI for all items of one year compared with the average CPI for all items of the previous year expressed as a percentage.
<b>Average annual percentage change</b>	The average annual percentage change is the change in the average index of one year compared with the average index of the previous year expressed as a percentage.
<b>CPI for administered prices</b>	An administered price is defined as the price of a product which is set consciously by an individual producer or group of producers and/or any price which can be determined or influenced by government, either directly or through a government agency/institution without reference to market forces. Products and services included are assessment rates, sanitary fees, refuse removal, water, electricity, paraffin, petrol, public transport – trains, motor licences, motor registration, telephone fees, postage, cell calls, television licence, school fees, university/technicons/colleges and university boarding fees.
<b>CPI for regulated prices</b>	Regulated prices are those administered prices that are monitored and controlled by government policy. To this end, price regulation does not necessarily imply the presence of an economic regulator, but the restriction on the extent to which prices may vary, depending on government's policy objective. Products and services included are water, electricity, paraffin, petrol, telephone fees, postage and cell calls.
<b>Inflation rate</b>	The inflation rate is the change in the CPI for all items of the relevant month of the current year compared with the CPI for all items of the same month in the previous year expressed as a percentage.
<b>Monthly percentage change</b>	The monthly percentage change is the change in the CPI of the relevant month compared with the CPI of the previous month expressed as a percentage.
<b>CPI per expenditure quintile</b>	quintile 1 - up to R 14 564; quintile 2 - R 14 565 up to R 23 278; quintile 3 - R 23 279 up to R 36 755; quintile 4 - R 36 756 up to R 79 152; and quintile 5 - R 79 153 and more.

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
