INFLATION RATE AT JULY 1996 THE HIGHEST SINCE AUGUST 1995

The official inflation rate, i.e. the annual rate of change in the Consumer Price Index, is **7,1%** at July 1996. This rate is 0,2 of a percentage point higher than the corresponding annual rate of 6,9% at June 1996, and 0,4 of a percentage point lower than the annual rate of 7,5% at August 1995.

From June 1996 to July 1996 the Consumer Price Index increased by 0,8%, while the seasonally adjusted index increased by 0,4% during the same period.

An alternative expression of the change in the CPI is to annualise the change between the average index of the three months up to July 1996 and the average index of the previous three months. This approach should use seasonally adjusted data, yielding a 8,6% increase and 9,3% unadjusted.

MONTHLY INCREASE OF 0,8%

The contributors to the monthly increase of 0,8% are the increases in the price indices for food (+0,3 of a percentage point), housing (+0,2 of a percentage point, mainly due to relatively large increases in assessment rates, which were slightly counteracted by a decrease of 1 percentage point in the interest rates on mortgage bonds), fuel and power (+0,1 of a percentage point), household operation (+0,1 of a percentage point) and all other items (+0,1 of a percentage point).

FOOD PRICES

Annual increase in food prices the highest since July 1995.

The price index for food shows an annual rate of increase of 4,8% at July 1996. This rate is 2,3 percentage points higher than the corresponding annual rate of 2,5% at June 1996, and 3,3 percentage points lower than the rate of 8,1% at July 1995.

From June 1996 to July 1996 food prices increased by 1,5%. This increase was caused by increases in the prices of grain products (+1,3%), meat (+1,4%), fish and other seafood (+0,7%), milk, cheese and eggs (+1,4%), fats and oils (+1,2%), fruit and nuts (+2,1%), vegetables (+2,9%), sugar (+0,6%), coffee, tea and cocoa (+0,4%) and "other" food items (+1,2%).

THE MONTHLY INCREASE IN THE PRICE INDEX FOR ALL ITEMS EXCLUDING FOOD IS 0,6%

Monthly increases in the price indices for non-alcoholic beverages (+0,9%), alcoholic beverages (+0,4%), cigarettes, cigars and tobacco (+0,5%), clothing and footwear (+0,2%), housing (+1,0%), fuel and power (+2,5%), furniture and equipment (+0,1%), household operation (+1,9%), medical care and health expenses (+0,4%), transport (+0,1%), communication (+1,1%), recreation and entertainment (+0,5%), reading matter (+0,6%), personal care (+0,3%) and "other" items (+0,8%) resulted in the monthly increase of 0,6% in the index for all items excluding food.

INCOME GROUP INDICES

An inflation rate of 6,9% was recorded for the lower income group, 7,5% for the middle income group and 6,9% for the higher income group.

URBAN AREAS INDICES

The highest inflation rate of 7,7% was recorded for Durban/Pinetown, while the lowest inflation rate of 6,0% was recorded for the Free State Goldfields.

Regarding food, the highest annual rate of increase of 7,2% was recorded for Durban/Pinetown, while the lowest rate of 2,8% was recorded for Bloemfontein.

INFLATION RATE FOR PENSIONERS

The inflation rate for pensioners is 7,2% at July 1996. The highest rate of increase of 7,8% was recorded for the Nelspruit/Witbank-area, while the lowest rate of increase of 5,9% was recorded for the Free State Goldfields.

FOOD INFLATION AS MEASURED AT CHAIN-STORES AND OTHER RETAILERS

Food prices at chain-stores show an annual rate of increase of 4,9%, while food prices at other retailers show an annual rate of increase of 4,2%. From June 1996 to July 1996, food prices at chain-stores increased by 1,5%, while food prices at other retailers increased by 1,3%.

CPI FOR AUGUST 1996

In addition to the normal price surveys for August 1996, it has come to the attention of the CSS that changed prices apply with effect from August 1996 with regard to certain urban areas' parking fees, bus tariffs, assesment rates, refuse removal and sanitary services.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

1. All price information refers to the first seven days of the relevant month.
2. The Consumer Price Indices relating to different urban areas as shown in Table 4 do not permit inter-urban comparison of price levels or living costs. The indices do not indicate whether it is more expensive to live in one city than in another. The indices indicate for each urban area, independently of any of the other urban areas, the price changes which have taken place from time to time.
3. Consumer Price Indices have been compiled for the areas Pietersburg and Nelspruit/Witbank as from July 1994. Although prices are collected in each of the respective areas, the indices for June 1994 and the weighting structure of Pretoria were used as basis for the CPI for Pietersburg and those of the Vaal Triangle as basis for Nelspruit/Witbank. The weighting structure of the said areas will be used until the Survey of the Expenditures of Households has taken place in 1995, and the weighting structure for each of the new areas will then be determined accordingly. Furthermore, it should be noted that the indices for the weighted average have been calculated excluding the new areas. The new areas will be taken into account in the calculation of the weighted average as soon as a weighting structure for each has been brought into effect.
4. The indices for all items excluding food, Table 4.4, have been calculated for each area separately as from July 1994. These indices are calculated by means of the indices for all items and food of each area.
5. Value Added Tax (VAT) is included in general in the prices of all items on which VAT is applicable.
6. A more comprehensive description of the weighting system, seasonal adjustment, price collection methodology, etc., appears in the brochure "Inflation" as well as in the notes of Chapter 3 of the Bulletin of Statistics.
