## **Consumer Price Index**

May 1997  
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## **OFFICIAL INFLATION RATE DOWN TO 9,5% AT MAY 1997**

*The official inflation rate, i.e. the annual rate of change in the Consumer Price Index, is 9,5% at May 1997. This rate is 0,4 of a percentage point lower than the corresponding rate of 9,9% at April 1997 - despite the relatively large increase in food inflation. From April 1997 to May 1997, the increase in the Consumer Price Index is 0,3%, while the increase in the seasonally adjusted index is 0,4% for the same period.*

## **CORE INFLATION RATE**

The core inflation rate (see note 7 on page 3) is 9,4% at May 1997. This rate is 0,4 of a percentage point lower than the corresponding rate of 9,8% at April 1997. The monthly increase (i.e. from April 1997 to May 1997) in the core inflation index is 0,3%.

## **MONTHLY CONTRIBUTIONS**

The monthly increase of 0,3% can be attributed to increases in the price indices for food (contributing +0,1 of a percentage point), housing (contributing +0,1 of a percentage point) and "other" items (contributing +0,1 of a percentage point).

## **FOOD INFLATION UP TO 11,7%, THE HIGHEST SINCE OCTOBER 1996 WHEN IT WAS 12,5%**

*The price index for food shows an annual rate of increase of 11,7% at May 1997. This rate is 1,2 percentage points higher than the corresponding rate of 10,5% at April 1997.*

The monthly increase of 0,5% was caused by increases in the price indices for meat (+0,4%), fish and other seafood (+1,3%), milk, cheese and eggs (+1,8%), fats and oils (+0,6%), vegetables (+1,3%), sugar (+1,6%) and "other" items (+0,6%). These increases were slightly counteracted by a decrease in the price index for fruit and nuts (-3,6%).

## **PRICE INDEX FOR NON-FOOD ITEMS SHOWS A MONTHLY INCREASE OF 0,3%**

The monthly increase of 0,3% in the price index for all items excluding food was the result of monthly increases in the price indices for non-alcoholic beverages (+0,9%), alcoholic beverages (+0,2%), cigarettes, cigars and tobacco (+1,5%), clothing and footwear (+0,4%), housing (+0,3%), furniture and equipment (+0,1%), household operation (+1,1%), transport (+0,1%), reading matter (+0,7%), education (+0,7%) and "other" items (+0,4%). These increases were partially counteracted by decreases in the price indices for recreation and entertainment (-0,2%) and personal care (-0,2%).

## **METROPOLITAN AND OTHER URBAN AREAS**

*The inflation rate for "metropolitan and other urban areas" will not be computable before January 1998, when the data for the previous twelve months will be available for comparison.*

## **METROPOLITAN AREAS INDICES**

The highest inflation rate of 11,0% was recorded for Bloemfontein, while the lowest inflation rate of 7,6% was recorded for the Free State Goldfields.

Regarding food prices, the highest annual increase of 14,8% was also recorded for Bloemfontein, while the lowest rate of increase of 8,2% was also recorded for the Free State Goldfields.

## **INFLATION RATE FOR PENSIONERS**

The inflation rate for pensioners is 10,0% at May 1997. The highest rate of increase of 11,6% was recorded for Pietersburg, while the lowest rate of increase of 7,3% was recorded for the Free State Goldfields.

## **FOOD INFLATION AS MEASURED AT CHAIN-STORES AND OTHER RETAILERS**

Food prices at chain-stores show an annual rate of increase of 12,3% at May 1997, while food prices at other retailers show an annual rate of increase of only 9,7%. From April 1997 to May 1997 food prices at chain-stores increased by 0,3%, while food prices at other retailers increased by as much as 1,1%.

## **AN ALTERNATIVE EXPRESSION OF THE CHANGE IN THE CONSUMER PRICE INDEX**

An alternative expression of the change in the Consumer Price Index is to annualise the percentage change between the average index of the three months up to May 1997 and the average of the previous three months. This approach, when using seasonally adjusted data, shows an increase of 7,6% (which is 0,9 of a percentage point lower than the corresponding rate of 8,5% for April 1997), while unadjusted data shows an increase of 8,6%.

## **CPI FOR JUNE 1997**

In addition to the normal price surveys for June 1997, it has come to the attention of the CSS that changed prices apply with effect from the first seven days of June 1997 regarding parking fees.

## **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

1. All price information refers to the first seven days of the reference month.
2. By the phrase "each area compared with itself", the CSS reminds the user that the consumer price indices relating to various metropolitan and other urban areas as shown in Table 4 and Table 6 do not permit inter-urban comparison of price levels or living costs. The indices do not indicate whether it is more expensive to live in one city than in another. The indices indicate for each urban area, independently of any of the other urban areas, the price changes which have taken place from time to time.
3. The indices for all items excluding food, Table 4.4, have been calculated for each area separately as from July 1994. These indices are calculated by means of the index for all items and the index for food of each area.
4. Value Added Tax (VAT) is included in general in the prices of all items on which VAT is applicable.
5. The five expenditure group categories or quintiles were defined according to total annual expenditure per household as in October 1995 as:

Very low expenditure group - up to R6 340  
Low expenditure group - R6 341 up to R11 590  
Middle expenditure group - R11 591 up to R21 909  
High expenditure group - R21 910 up to R49 498  
Very high expenditure group - R49 499 and more

6. A more detailed set of weights for the metropolitan and other urban areas in total according to the new 1995-weighting structure of the CPI, as well as that for the core basket were published in Statistical release P0141.5 of 27 March 1997.

## **7. Core inflation**

The primary objective of calculating core inflation is to capture the underlying inflation pressures in the economy i.e. the trend in the general price level which reflects the balance between aggregate demand and supply in the economy over the medium term. Core inflation is a measure designed in relation to the specific structure of a country's economy. Hence in the South African context, core inflation is derived by excluding items from the CPI basket on the basis that changes in their prices are highly volatile, subjected to temporary influences, or affected by government intervention and policy.

Items excluded from the CPI basket to obtain the "core" basket, and the reasons for exclusion are as follows:

\* Fresh and frozen meat and fish: Prices may be highly volatile, particularly during and following periods of

drought.

- \* Fresh and frozen vegetables and fresh fruit and nuts: Prices may be highly volatile from quarter to quarter due to their sensitivity to climatic conditions.
- \* Interest rates on mortgage bonds and overdrafts/personal loans: These are excluded due to their "perverse" effect on the CPI. A tightening in monetary policy to counter inflation pressures would cause interest rates to rise and be reflected in the interest cost component of measured inflation. This, in turn, could provoke a further tightening of monetary policy resulting in excessive movements in the inflation rate.
- \* VAT (Value Added Tax): VAT is predominantly determined by government (fiscal policy).
- \* Property taxes: These taxes are predominantly determined by local government.

The choice of exclusions was informed by best practice amongst several other international agencies, and after consultation with the South African Reserve Bank and other local technical experts.
