Prices : Consumer Price Index

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INFLATION RATE INCREASES SUBSTANTIALLY

The official inflation rate, i.e. the annual rate of change in the Consumer Price Index, is 8,4% at September 1996. This is 0,9 of a percentage point higher than the corresponding annual rate of 7,5% at August 1996.

The Consumer Price Index, as well as the seasonally adjusted index, increased by 1,0% from August 1996 to September 1996.

An alternative expression of the change in the CPI is to annualise the change between the average index of the three months up to September 1996 and the average index of the previous three months. This approach should use seasonally adjusted data, yielding a 8,9% increase and 9,7% unadjusted.

MONTHLY INCREASE OF 1,0%

The contributors to the monthly increase of 1,0% are the increases in the price indices for food (+0,4 of a percentage point), cigarettes, cigars and tobacco (+0,1 of a percentage point), housing (+0,1 of a percentage point), furniture and equipment (+0,1 of a percentage point), medical care and health expenses (+0,1 of a percentage point), personal care (+0,1 of a percentage point) and all other items (+0,1 of a percentage point).

FOOD PRICES

The price index for food shows an annual rate of increase of 10,4% at September 1996. This rate is 2,5 percentage points higher than the corresponding annual rate of 7,9% at August 1996. This is the first time since June 1995 that South Africa has a double-digit food inflation.

From August 1996 to September 1996 food prices increased by 1,9%. This increase was caused by monthly increases in the prices of grain products (+2,2%), meat (+1,0%), fish and other seafood (+2,7%), milk, cheese and eggs (+1,6%), fats and oils (+0,4%), vegetables (+8,6%) and "other" food items (+1,1%). These increases were slightly counteracted by decreases in the prices of fruit and nuts (-1,7%) and sugar (-0,4%).

PRICE INDEX FOR ALL ITEMS EXCLUDING FOOD SHOWS A MONTHLY INCREASE OF 0,8%

The monthly increase of 0,8% in the index for all items excluding food is the result of monthly increases in the price indices for alcoholic beverages (+0,3%), cigarettes, cigars and tobacco (+3,9%), clothing and footwear (+0,2%), housing (+0,6%), fuel and power (+0,1%), furniture and equipment (+1,8%), household operation (+0,7%), medical care and health expenses (+1,4%), recreation and entertainment (+0,9%), reading matter (+2,7%), personal care (+2,2%) and "other" items (+1,2%). These increases were slightly counteracted by a decrease in the price index for transport (-0,1%, mainly due to a decrease of 3c/litre in the price of petrol).

INCOME GROUP INDICES

An inflation rate of 8,6% was recorded for the lower income group, 9,0% for the middle income group and 8,1% for the higher income group.

URBAN AREAS INDICES

The highest inflation rate of 9,4% was recorded for the Cape Peninsula and for Durban/Pinetown, while the lowest inflation rate of 7,4% was recorded for the Klerksdorp/Stilfontein/Orkey area.

Regarding food, the highest annual rate of increase of 13,1% was recorded for East Londen, while the lowest rate of 8,6% was recorded for the Free State Goldfields.

INFLATION RATE FOR PENSIONERS

The inflation rate for pensioners is 8,8% at September 1996. The highest rate of increase of 9,8% was recorded for the Cape Peninsula, while the lowest rate of increase of 6,7% was recorded for the Free State Goldfields.

FOOD INFLATION AS MEASURED AT CHAIN-STORES AND OTHER RETAILERS

Food prices at chain-stores show an annual rate of increase of 10,3% at September 1996, while food prices at other retailers show an annual rate of increase of 10,4%. From August 1996 to September 1996, food prices at chain-stores increased by 1,8%, while food prices at other retailers increased by 1,9%.

CPI FOR OCTOBER 1996

In addition to the normal price surveys for October 1996, it has come to the attention of the CSS that changed prices apply with effect from October 1996 with regard to newspapers and certain urban areas' water tariffs and housing.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

1. All price information refers to the first seven days of the reference month.
2. The Consumer Price Indices relating to various urban areas as shown in Table 4 do not permit inter-urban comparison of price levels or living costs. The indices do not indicate whether it is more expensive to live in one city than in another. The indices indicate for each urban area, independently of any of the other urban areas, the price changes which have taken place from time to time.
3. Consumer Price Indices have been compiled for the areas Pietersburg and Nelspruit/Witbank as from July 1994. Although prices are collected in each of the respective areas, the indices for June 1994 and the weighting structure of Pretoria were used as basis for the CPI for Pietersburg and those of the Vaal Triangle as basis for Nelspruit/Witbank. The weighting structure of the said areas will be used until the results of the Survey of the Expenditure of Households, which took place in 1995 are available, and the weighting structure for each of the new areas will then be determined accordingly.
Furthermore, it should be noted that the indices for the weighted average have been calculated excluding the new areas. The new areas will be taken into account in the calculation of the weighted average as soon as a weighting structure for each has been brought into effect.
4. The indices for all items excluding food, Table 4.4, have been calculated for each area separately as from July 1994. These indices are calculated by means of the index for all items and the index for food of each area.

5. Value Added Tax (VAT) is included in general in the prices of all items on which VAT is applicable.
6. A more comprehensive description of the weighting system, seasonal adjustment, price collection methodology, etc., appears in the brochure "Inflation" as well as in the notes to Chapter 3 of the Bulletin of Statistics.
7. The three income group categories were defined according to average direct annual income as in October 1990 as:

Lower income group - up to R15 999
Middle income group - R16 000 up to R39 999
Higher income group - R40 000 and more

When these average annual incomes are inflated the income group categories will be defined according to 1995 values as:

Lower income group - up to R27 295
Middle income group - R27 296 up to R68 239
Higher income group - R68 240 and more
