## KEY FINDINGS

**Note:** South African departures and arrivals are no longer required to have passport barcodes scanned at the ports of entry and exit; therefore, statistics on their departure and arrival are no longer available. Moreover those departing through the three international airports are no longer required to complete departure forms. This is due to the implementation of the Immigration Act (No. 13 of 2002) by the Department of Home Affairs as from April 2003.

### 1. Foreign travellers

The total number of foreign travellers who visited South Africa from mainland Africa, overseas and unspecified countries, arriving through all ports of entry during April 2004 was **584 365**. The April 2004 figure represents **an increase of 2,1%** as compared with the April 2003 figure of 572 603 ( See Table 1.1.1).

During April 2004, the most common mode of travel used by foreign travellers arriving in South Africa was road, involving 409 719 (70,1%) travellers, followed by air, involving 157 096 (26,9%) travellers. Of the total number of foreign travellers arriving by air, 123 313 (78,5%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport while 31 594 (20,1%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport, 761 (0,5%) arrived through Durban International Airport and the rest, 1 428 (0,9%), arrived through other airports (See Table 1.1.2).

For the total number of foreign travellers departing, road constituted the most common mode of travel 356 527 (66,9%), then followed by air 174 991 (32,8%). Of the total number of foreign travellers departing by air, 133 103 (76,1%) departed from Johannesburg International Airport, 40 096 (22,9%) departed from Cape Town International Airport, 699 (0,4%) used Durban International Airport and the rest, 1 093 (0,6%), departed through other airports (See Table 1.1.2). Figure 1 shows the breakdown of air arrivals and departures according to the airport used.

### 2. Ports of entry and modes of travel used by overseas and mainland Africa travellers

#### 2.1 Overseas travellers

During April 2004, **151 607** overseas travellers visited South Africa. The April 2004 figure represents **a decrease of 1,4%** over the April 2003 figure of 153 764.

The figures show that for April 2004, there were 128 145 air arrivals from overseas, which accounts for 84,5% of all overseas arrivals. Of these overseas air arrivals, 97 121 (75,8%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport; 29 609 (23,1%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport; 582 (0,5%) arrived through Durban International Airport and the rest, 833 (0,7%), arrived through other airports.

The number of overseas travellers arriving by road during April 2004 was 22 156 (14,6%). The number of travellers arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 1 306 (0,9%) as shown in Table 1.2.1.

#### 2.2 Mainland Africa travellers

The total number of travellers who arrived in South Africa from mainland Africa during April 2004 was **416 865**, as compared to the April 2003 figure of 405 016, this represents **an increase of 2,9%**. Of these travellers from mainland Africa, the number arriving by road was 386 558 (92,7%).

For the same month, there were 28 194 (6,8%) air travellers arriving from mainland Africa. Of these air arrivals, 25 589 (90,8%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport, 1 885 (6,7%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport, 179 (0,6%) arrived through Durban International Airport while the rest, 541 (1,9%), arrived through other airports. The number of travellers from mainland Africa arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 2 113 (0,5%) as shown in Table 1.2.1.

### 3. Purpose of visit

Of the 151 607 overseas travellers visiting South Africa during April 2004, 138 581 (91,4%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 5 962 (3,9%) stated that they were on business trips. Overseas travellers on transit in South Africa were 1 444 (1,0%) of the total number, those travellers arriving for the purpose of work (including contract work) were 4 370 (2,9%) and those visiting for the purpose of study were 1 206 (0,8%) as shown in Table 1.2.2.

**Mainland Africa travellers:** Of the 416 865 travellers from mainland Africa visiting South Africa during April 2004, an overwhelming majority 379 689 (91,1%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 12 454 (3,0%) stated that they were on business trips. A further breakdown of travellers from mainland Africa is as follows: travellers in transit were 4 843 (1,2%), those visiting for the purpose of study were 12 867 (3,1%) and those travellers arriving for the purpose of work (including contract work) were 6 697 (1,6%) as shown in Table 1.2.2.

### 4. Leading source countries of overseas and mainland Africa travellers

**Overseas travellers:** Figure 2a indicates that during April 2004, the number of travellers from the UK visiting South Africa was 38 614 (25,5%), making it the leading country of origin of overseas travellers. This was followed by travellers from Germany, 17 254 (11,4%); and the USA, 16 403 (10,8%). Other main countries of origin of overseas travellers were: France, 9 329 (6,2%); the Netherlands, 6 746 (4,4%); Australia, 5 800 (3,8%); India, 3 611 (2,4%) and Italy, 3 543 (2,3%). Upon comparing the figures for April 2004 with those of April 2003 (see Figure 2b), the highest increase in the number of arrivals from these leading source countries was for India, (30,4% increase from 2 770 in 2003 to 3 611 in 2004). The main stated purpose of visit for travellers coming from these leading source countries was holidays, followed by business.

**Travellers from mainland Africa:** During April 2004, the top eight countries (Figure 3a) in mainland Africa from which travellers arriving in South Africa came from were: Lesotho, 123 162 (29,5%); Botswana, 87 527 (21,0%); Swaziland, 77 897 (18,7%); Zimbabwe, 44 695 (10,7%); Mozambique, 34 132 (8,2%); Namibia, 20 209 (4,8%); Zambia, 9 939 (2,4%) and Malawi, 6 169 (1,5%). When comparing arrival figures from mainland Africa, (see Figure 3b) for 2003 and 2004, there was an increase in the number of travellers arriving from Lesotho, (16,3% increase from 105 875 in 2003 to 123 162 in 2004).

## 5. Migration

### 5.1 Documented immigration

**Note:** For the purpose of clarification, as per definition, 'undocumented immigrants' will not appear in the statistics collected. It is against this background that we report the migration statistics for April 2004.

Table 2.3 indicates that in April 2004, the leading source countries of documented immigrants were: Zimbabwe, 88 (13,7%); Nigeria, 82 (12,8), the UK, 49 (7,6%); Pakistan, 37 (5,8%) and China 37 (5,8%).

### 5.2 Historical trends in tourism

It should be borne in mind that there is often quite a substantial month to month variation in tourism figures, and one needs to look at a longer period of several months to be able to detect any trends and patterns. The trend regarding the number of overseas travellers arriving in South Africa since 2000 is shown in Figure 4. Although the figure shows evidence of seasonal fluctuations, the level of overseas tourism over the period has shown an upward trend since 2000.

## EXPLANATORY NOTES

### 1. Sources of data

Legal movements across South African borders as well as legal immigration into South Africa fall under the jurisdiction of the Department of Home Affairs (DHA). Information on tourism and documented immigration is obtained from all ports of entry. Information on arrivals into and departures from South Africa is captured by DHA and loaded onto the mainframe at State Information Technology Agency (SITA). Stats SA accesses this data remotely, which is then used as part of the input data for this report. Information on legal immigrants to South Africa is sent to Stats SA on computer printout from DHA. The information on the printout is coded and captured by clerical staff at Stats SA.

South African departures and arrivals are no longer required to have their barcodes scanned or complete departure forms at the ports of entry and exit, therefore, statistics on their departure and arrival is no longer available. This is due to the implementation of the Immigration Act (No. 13 of 2002) by DHA as from April 2003.

### 2. Glossary of terms

Key terms used in this release are defined as follows:

**Tourism** comprises the activities of persons travelling to and staying in places outside their usual environment for not more than one consecutive year for leisure, business and other purposes. The usual environment of a person consists of a certain area around his/her place of residence plus all other places s/he frequently visits.

A **tourist** (overnight visitor) is a visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited. An international tourist is an international visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the country visited. A domestic tourist refers to a domestic visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited.

**Traveller** is any person on a trip between two or more localities. An **international traveller** refers to any person on a trip between two or more localities in different countries. A **domestic traveller** refers to any person on a trip between two or more localities in his/her country of residence.

**Visitor** refers to any person travelling to a place other than that of his/her usual environment for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of the trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

An **international visitor** is any person travelling to a country other than the one in which s/he has his/her usual residence, but outside his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of the trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

**Domestic visitor** refers to any person residing in a country, who travels to a place within that country other than the one in which s/he has his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of the trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

**Overseas traveller** refers to a number of foreign travellers visiting South Africa (SA), excluding travellers from mainland Africa and from 'unspecified' countries.

**Foreign traveller** refers to a person who resides outside SA and visits the country temporarily.

**South African residents** are persons residing in SA (South African citizens and persons with permanent residence) who leave the country temporarily.

**Documented immigrants** refer to residents of other countries who have been accepted as permanent residents in South Africa. The permanent residence status could be given either before or after arrival in South Africa.

**Self-declared emigrants** refer to South African residents who, at the time of departing from South Africa, state their intention to leave the country and reside permanently elsewhere.

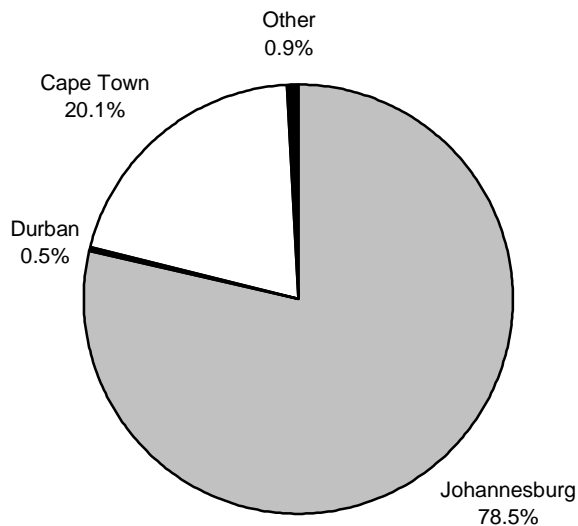

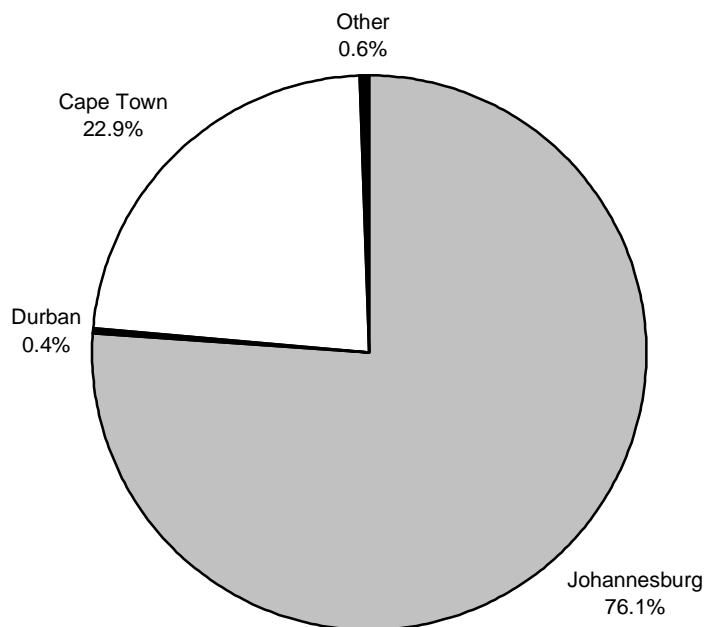

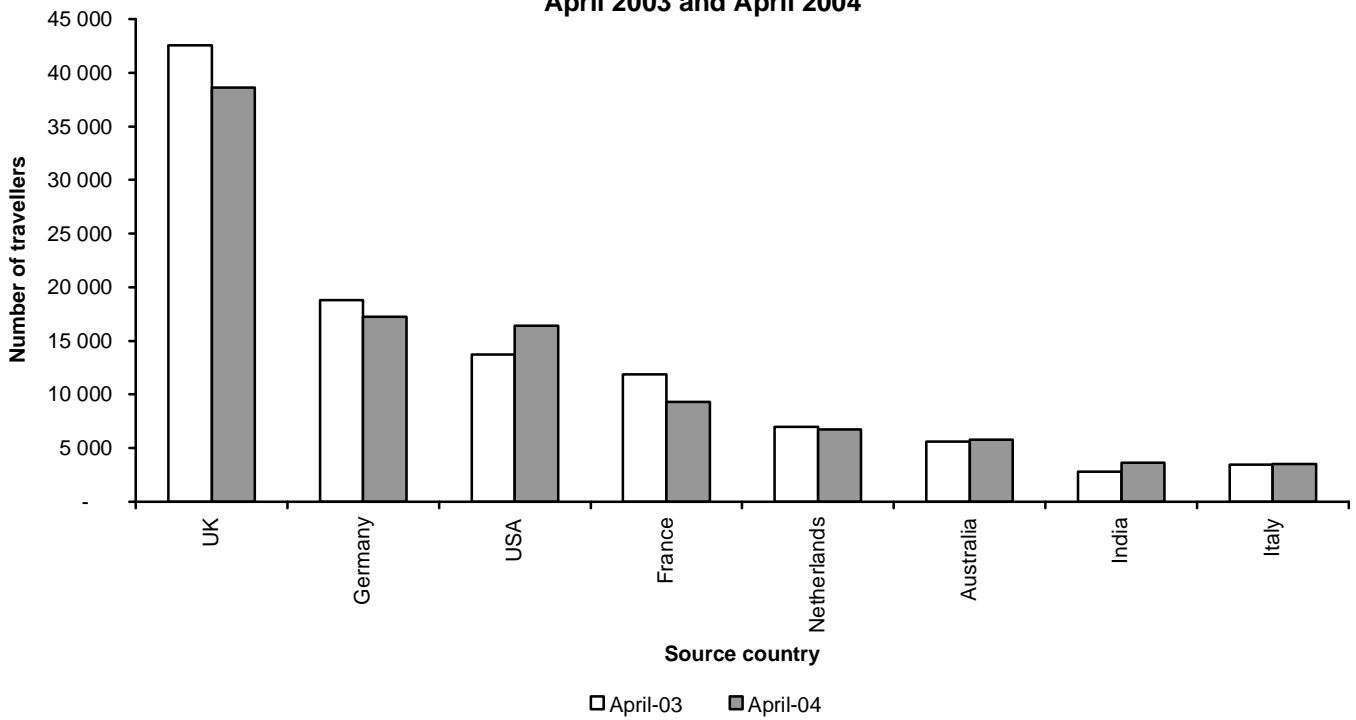
**Fig 1a: Air arrivals by port of entry, South Africa, April 2004**



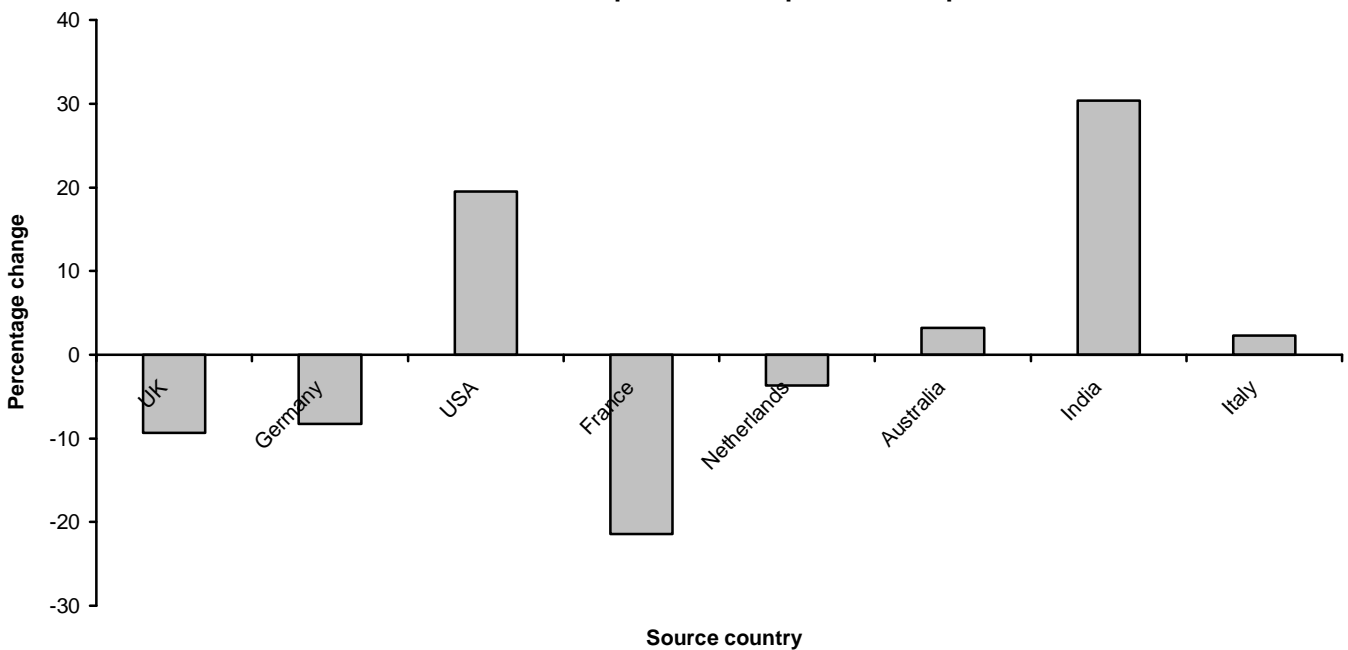
**Fig 1b: Air departures by port of exit, South Africa, April 2004**



**Fig. 2a: The number of overseas travellers arriving from leading source countries in April 2003 and April 2004**

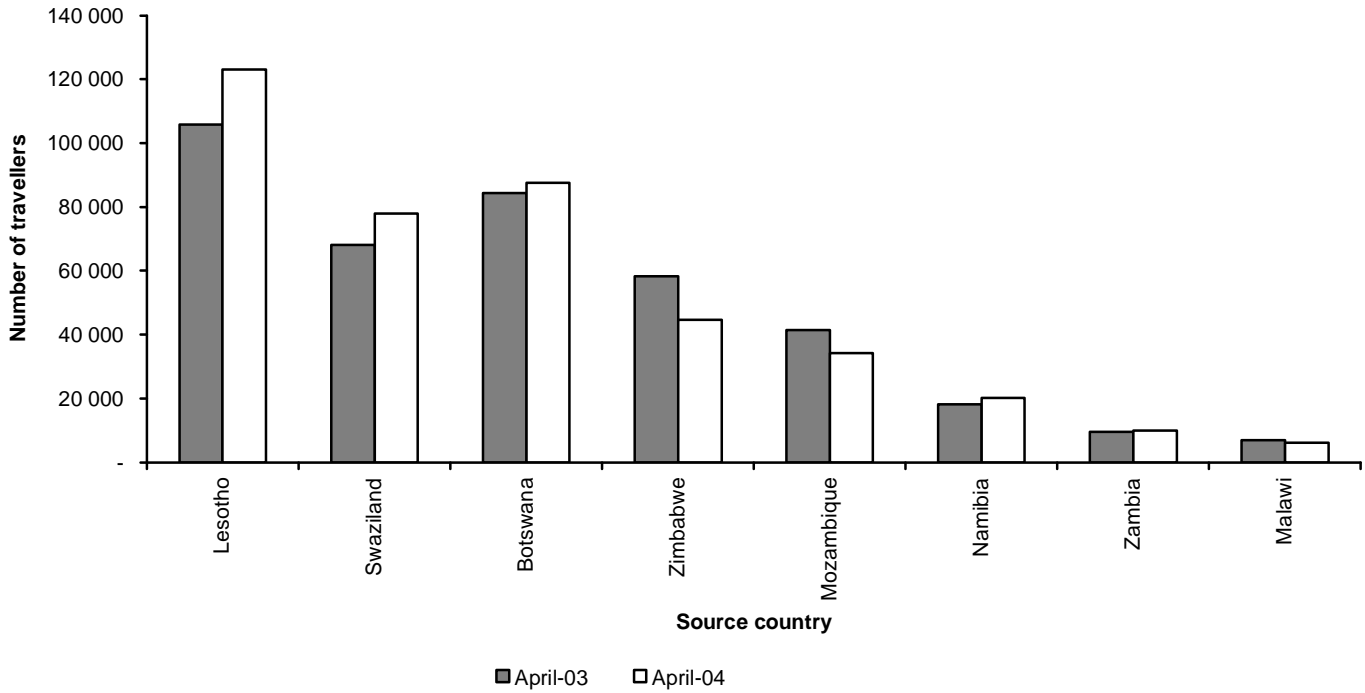


**Fig. 2b: Percentage change in number of overseas travellers arriving from leading source countries in April 2004 compared with April 2003**

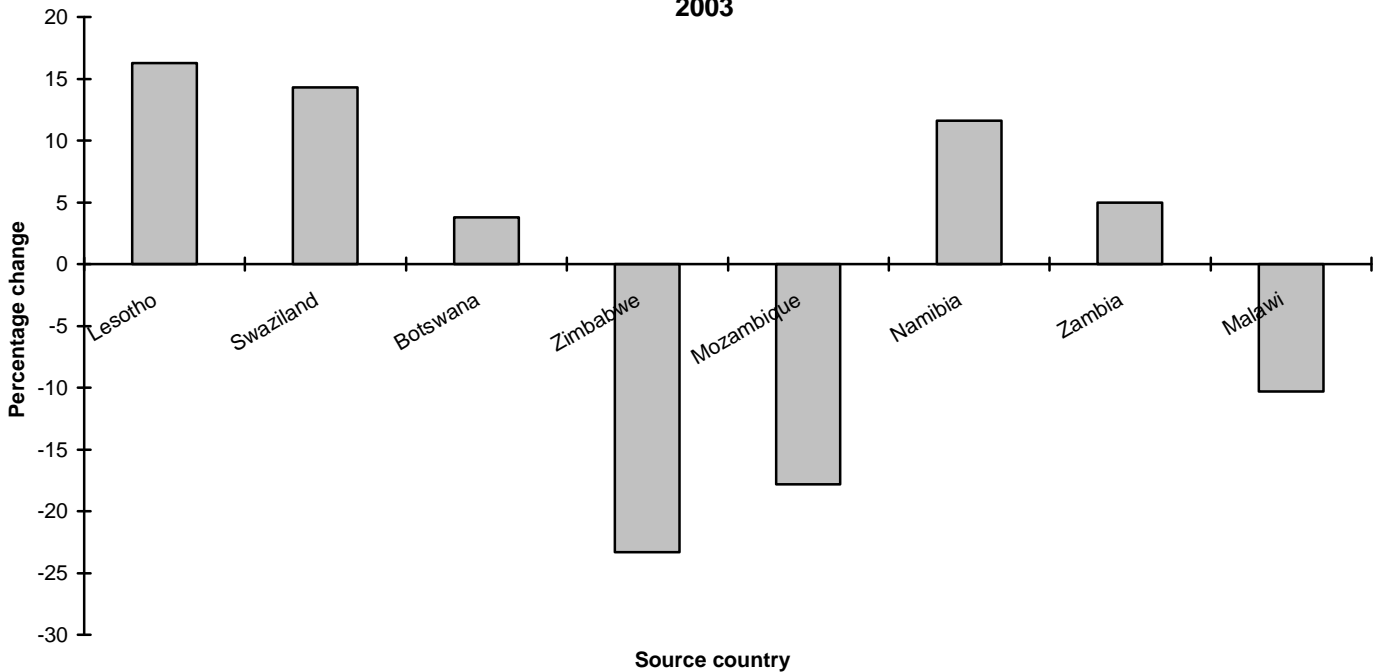




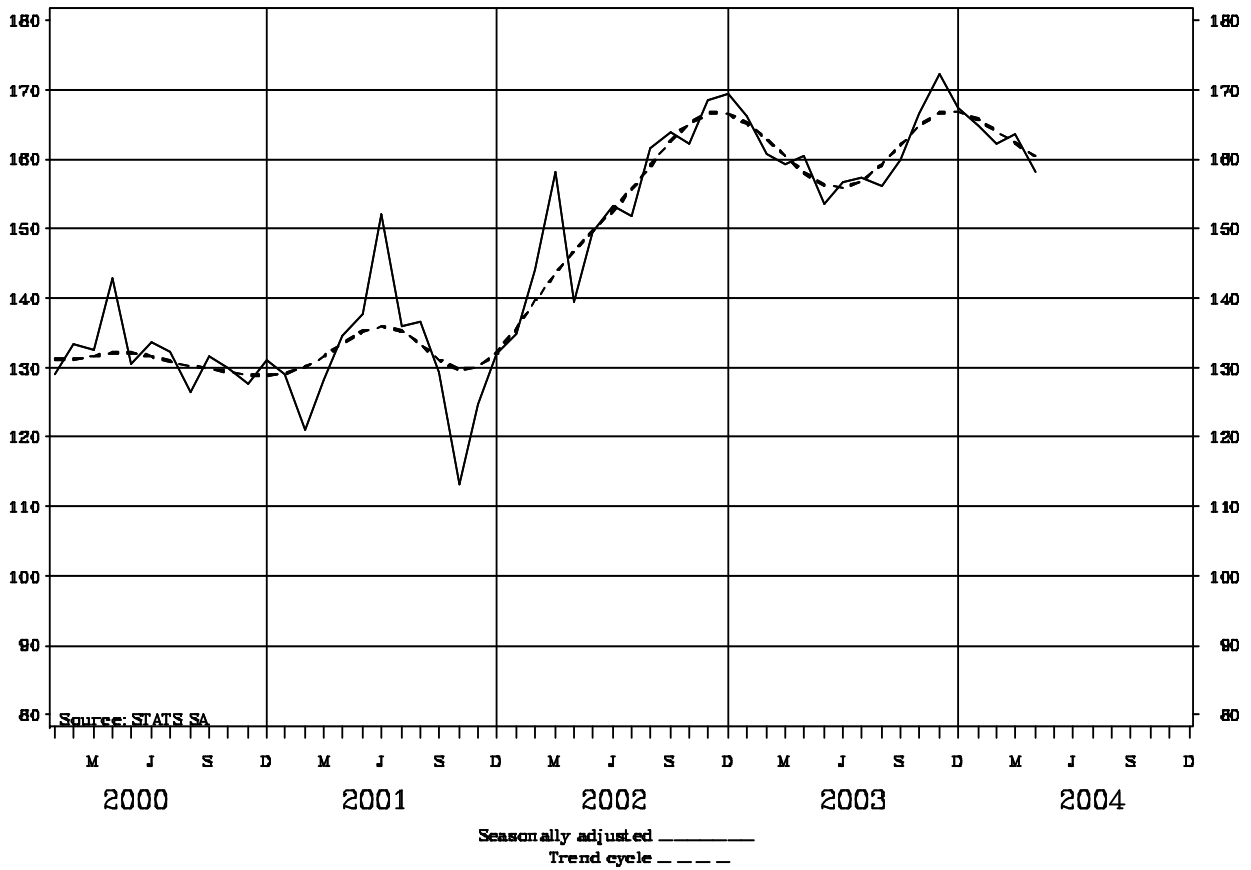
**Fig. 3a: The number of travellers from mainland African countries arriving from leading source countries in April 2003 and April 2004**
