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KEY FINDINGS

THE NUMBER OF OVERSEAS FOREIGN TRAVELLERS VISITING THE RSA DURING FEBRUARY 2000 WAS

151 914, AN INCREASE OF 5,9% AS COMPARED TO THE FEBRUARY 1999 FIGURE OF 143 461.

Total foreign travellers: Summary

The total number of foreign travellers (from overseas and from the rest of Africa) visiting the RSA during February 2000 increased by 0,8% from 454 013 in February 1999 to 457 658 in February 2000.

The total number of foreign travellers who visited the RSA from mainland Africa, overseas and unspecified countries, arriving through all ports of entry during February 2000 was 457 658. The February 2000 figure represents an increase of 0,8% as compared with February 1999 figure of 454 013.

During February 2000, the most common mode of travel used by foreign travellers in arriving in South Africa was road, involving 293 799 (64,2%) trips followed by 153 806 (33,6%) air flights. Of the total number of foreign travellers arriving by air, 112 549 (73,2%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport while 39 198 (25,5%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport and 632 (0,4%) arrived through Durban International Airport.

Similarly, in departing from the RSA, the most common mode of travel used by foreign travellers was road, involving 262 747 (64,2%) trips followed by air flights, 143 534 (35,1%). Of the total number of foreign travellers departing by air, 105 618 (73,6%) departed using Johannesburg International Airport, 35 766 (24,9%) departed using Cape Town International Airport and 683 (0,5%) used Durban International Airport. Figure 1 shows the breakdown of air arrivals and departures according to the airpor used.

Ports of entry/mode of travel used by overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

Overseas travellers

Of the total overseas air arrivals during February 2000, 92 554 (70,3%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport.

During February 2000, 151 914 overseas travellers visited the RSA. The February 2000 figure represents an increase of 5,9% over the February 1999 figure of 143 461. The figures show that for February 2000, there were 131 674 air arrivals from overseas which accounts for 86,7% of all overseas arrivals. Of these overseas air arrivals, 92 554 (70,3%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport; 37 960 (28,8%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport; 456 (0,3%) arrived through Durban International Airport and the rest, 704 (0,5%), arrived through other airports.

The number of overseas travellers arriving by road during February 2000 was 18 387 (12,1%). The number arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 1 853 (1,2%).

Travellers from mainland Africa

A total of 274 637 (92,7%) travellers arrived from mainland Africa by road and a further 21 351 (7,2%) arrived by air. Of these air arrivals, 19 327 (90,5%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport.

The total number of travellers who arrived in the RSA from mainland Africa during February 2000 was 296 375. Compared to the February 1999 figure of 298 678, this represents a decrease of 0,8%. Of these travellers from mainland Africa, the number arriving by road was 274 637 (92,7%).

For the same month, there were 21 351 (7,2%) air arrivals from mainland Africa. Of these air arrivals, 19 327 (90,5%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport, 1 224 (5,7%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport, 173 (0,8%) arrived through Durban International Airport while the rest, 627 (2,9%), arrived through other airports. The number of travellers from mainland Africa arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 387 (0,1%).

Purpose of visit as stated by overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

Overseas travellers

In February 2000, 122 920 (80,9%) overseas travellers came to the RSA for holidays.

Of the 151 914 overseas travellers visiting the RSA during February 2000, 122 920 (80,9%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 18 679 (12,3%) stated that they were on a business trip.

Overseas travellers on transit in the RSA numbered 5 337 (3,5%), those visiting for the purpose of study numbered 1 300 (0,9%) and those visiting for the purpose of work (including contract work) numbered 584 (2,4%).

Travellers from mainland Africa

In February 2000, 248 054 (83,7%) travellers from mainland Africa came to the RSA for holidays.

Of the 296 375 travellers from mainland Africa visiting the RSA during February 2000, 248 054 (83,7%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 29 816 (10,1%) stated that they were on a business trip. Transit visitors numbered 5 517 (1,9%), those visiting for the purpose of study numbered 5 246 (1,8%) and those visiting for the purpose of work (including contract work) numbered 6 328 (2,1%).

Leading source countries of overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

Overseas travellers

In February 2000, the leading source country of overseas arrivals was the UK, 40 223 (26,5%) followed by Germany 21 524 (14,2%) and the USA, 14 334 (9,4%).

During February 2000, the number of travellers from the UK visiting the RSA was 40 223 (26,5%), making it the leading country of origin of overseas travellers. This was followed by travellers from Germany, 21 524 (14,2%). The other main countries of origin of overseas travellers were: the USA, 14 334 (9,4%), France, 9 340 (6,1%), the Netherlands, 8 400 (5,5%), Australia, 3 986 (2,6%), Switzerland, 3 597 (2,4%) and Italy, 3 040 (2,0%). Upon comparing the figures for February 2000 with those of February 1999, the highest increase in the number of arrivals from these leading source countries was for Australia, (14,8% up from 3 471) and France, (14,6% up from 8 152), as shown in Figure 2. The main stated purpose of visit for travellers coming from these leading source countries was holidays, followed by business.

Travellers from mainland Africa

The leading source country of travellers from mainland Africa in February 2000 was Lesotho, 123 058 (41,5%).

During February 2000, the top eight countries in mainland Africa from which travellers arriving in the RSA came, were: Lesotho, 123 058 (41,5%), Swaziland, 51 163 (17,3%), Mozambique, 32 718 (11,0%), Botswana, 29 511 (10,0%), Zimbabwe, 27 926 (9,4%), Namibia, 12 488 (4,2%), and Malawi, 5 086 (1,7%). When comparing arrival figures from mainland Africa, for 1999 and 2000, there were

increases in the number of travellers arriving from Lesotho, (11,7% up from 110 190), Zambia, (11,4% up from 4 539), Malawi, (6,0% up from 4 800), and Mozambique, (5,3% up from 31 058), as shown in Figure 3. For the same comparison period, of the leading mainland African countries, those that had decreases in the number of arriving travellers were Zimbabwe, (22,7% down from 35 787) and Botswana, (17,9% down from 35 960).

Departing South African residents

South African residents: Purpose of travel

During February 2000, South African residents travelled within mainland Africa more for business than for holidays (68,8% as opposed to 30,3%) and similarly, they travelled overseas more for holidays than business (64,3% as opposed to 32,9%).

During February 2000, the total number of South African residents who departed 'temporarily' (through all ports of exit) was 233 962, an increase of 1,8% compared to the number of South African residents who departed temporarily during the same month in 1999. Of these departing South African residents, the number who travelled by air was 83 160 (35,5%) in February 2000. Of those who travelled by air and left through the three international airports of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban, 50 635 (60,9%) filled in departure forms. From the completed February 2000 departure forms, one can see that, on the whole, South African residents travelled within mainland Africa more for business than holidays (68,8% as opposed to 30,3%) and travelled overseas more for holidays than business (64,3% as opposed to 32,9%).

South African residents: Destination countries

The two leading destinations for South African residents for February 2000 were the UK, 9 061 (17,9%) and the USA, 3 376 (6,7%).

The predominant mode of travel used by South Africans departing temporarily from the RSA in February 2000 was road, 150 531 (64,3%) followed by air, 83 160 (35,5%).

For South African residents who departed temporarily in February 2000 using the three international airports as ports of exit, the leading countries of destination were the UK, 9 061 (17,9%), the USA, 3 376 (6,7%), Namibia, 2 726 (5,4%), Zimbabwe, 2 409 (4.8%), Australia, 2 381 (4,7%), Saudi Arabia, 2 100 (4,1%), Mauritius, 1 714 (3,4%), and Germany, 1 522 (3,0%). As shown in Figure 4, among these leading destination countries, Saudi Arabia showed a significant decrease in the number of visiting South African residents during February 2000 as compared to February 1999, (24,7% down from 2 618).

Returning South African residents

The number of returning South African residents in February 2000 was 231 142, an increase of 1,3% compared to those returning during February 1999. The predominant mode of travel used by South Africans in returning to the RSA was road, 156 983 (67,9%) followed by air 74 012 (32,0%).

Of the South African residents returning by air, 60 393 (81,6%) used Johannesburg International Airport as port of re-entry while 8 981 (12,1%) used Cape Town International Airport as port of re-entry. For the same month in 2000, the number of South African residents returning through Durban International Airport was 1 700 (2,3%).

Documented immigration and self-declared emigration

The four leading sources of documented immigrants to the RSA in February 2000 were, the UK, 49 (16,0%), India, 29 (9,5%), China, 22 (7,2%) and Taiwan, 18 (5,9%). The four leading destination countries for self-declared emigrants during February 2000 were the UK, 193 (26,2%), Australia, 118 (16,0%), New Zealand, 91 (12,3%) and the USA, 71 (9,6%).

For the purpose of clarification, in the migration statistics published here, the emigration status reported refers to self-declared status. South Africans who leave permanently under the pretext of temporary visits will not appear as emigrants in the emigration statistics collected. Similarly, as per definition, 'undocumented immigrants' will not appear in the statistics collected. It is against this background that we report the migration statistics for February 2000.

The number of self-declared emigrants departing through the three international airports was 737 in February 2000. For documented immigrants into the RSA, the number approved as immigrants (either before or after arrival) was 306 for February 2000.

In February 2000, the leading source countries of documented immigrants were: the UK, 49 (16,0%), India, 29 (9,5%), China, 22 (7,2%) and Taiwan, 18 (5,9%) For the same month in 2000, the leading destination countries for self-declared emigrants were; the UK, 193 (26,2%), Australia, 118 (16,0%), New Zealand, 91 (12,3%), the USA, 71 (9,6%), Canada, 42 (5,7%) and Namibia, 35 (4,7%) as shown in Figure 5.

Historical trends in tourism, immigration and self-declared emigration

It should be borne in mind that there is often quite a substantial month to month variation in tourism and migration figures, and one needs to look at a longer period of several months to be able to detect any trends and patterns. The trend regarding the number of overseas travellers arriving in the RSA since 1994 is shown in Figure 6. Although the figure shows evidence of seasonal fluctuations, the level of overseas tourism over the period has shown an upward trend. The historical trends in the number of immigrants are self-declared emigrants are shown in Figure 7. The figure shows that since 1994, the number of

documented immigrants has remained less than the number of self-declared emigrants. The gap between the two which has been narrowing down since the second half of 1999, has been widening apart during th first quarter of 2000.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Source of data and background

Legal movements across South African borders as well as legal immigration into South Africa fall under the jurisdiction of the Department of Home Affairs (DHA). Information on tourism and documented immigration are obtained from all ports of entry while the data on self-declared emigration statistics are obtained from only the three international airports of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban. Information on arrivals into and departures from the RSA are captured by DHA and loaded unto the mainframe at Bureau Nucleus. Stats SA accesses this data remotely, which is then used as part of the input data for this report. Information on emigration from the RSA and reason for temporary departure of South African residents is obtained from departure forms. The forms are sent to Stats SA on a weekly basis for data capture and processing. Lastly, information on legal immigrants to the RSA is sent to Stats SA on computer printout from DHA. The information on the printout is coded and captured by clerical staff at Stats SA.

Stats SA published complete emigration data up to and including December 1992. Since basic information on emigration was not available thereafter, it was not possible to publish data on emigration on a monthly basis for the period May 1993 to November 1993. However, as from 26 November 1993, the Department of Home Affairs implemented a system according to which South African residents departing for overseas from Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban International Airports complete departure forms. The system was implemented at these three airports only since approximately 97% of the emigrants left the country through these three ports. This system again made it possible to obtain and process information on South African tourists and emigrants leaving the country through these three ports as from November 1993.

Clarification of terms used in the tables

For foreign travellers, the category "overseas total" excludes travellers from mainland Africa and from "unspecified" countries.

Meanings of symbols used in the tables

- = nil

.. = not applicable

? = unspecified

Glossary of some terms used in tourism statistics

Tourism comprises the activities of persons travelling to and staying in places outside their usual environment for not more than one consecutive year for leisure, business and other purposes. The usual environment of a person consists of a certain area around his/her place of residence plus all other places s/he frequently visits.

A Tourist (overnight visitor) is a visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited. An <u>international tourist</u> is an international visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the country visited. A **domestic tourist** refers to a domestic visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited.

Traveller is any person on a trip between two or more localities. **An international traveller refers** to any person on a trip between two or more localities in different countries. **A domestic traveller** refers to any person on a trip between two or more localities in his/her country of residence.

Visitor refers to any person travelling to a place other than that of his/her usual environment for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

An international visitor is any person travelling to a country other than the one in which he/she has his/her usual residence, but outside his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

Domestic visitor refers to any person residing in a country, who travels to a place within that country other than the one in which s/he has his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.
