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KEY FINDINGS

THE NUMBER OF OVERSEAS FOREIGN TRAVELLERS VISITING SOUTH AFRICA DURING FEBRUARY 2002 WAS 164 721, AN INCREASE OF 19,5% AS COMPARED TO THE FEBRUARY 2001 FIGURE OF 137 802.

Total foreign travellers: Summary

The total number of foreign travellers (from overseas and from the rest of Africa) visiting South Africa during February 2002 increased by 10,7% from 453 138 in February 2001 to 501 387 in February 2002.

The total number of foreign travellers who visited South Africa from mainland Africa, overseas and unspecified countries, arriving through all ports of entry during February 2002 was 501 387. The February 2002 figure represents an increase of 10,7% as compared with the February 2001 figure of 453 138.

During February 2002, the most common mode of travel used by foreign travellers in arriving in South Africa was road, involving 320 490 (63,9%) road travellers followed by air, involving 166 955 (33,3%) air travellers. Of the total number of foreign travellers arriving by air, 123 840 (74,2%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport while 41 091 (24,6%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport, 1 303 (0,8%) arrived through Durban International Airport and the rest, 721 (0,4%), arrived through other airports.

In departing from South Africa, the most common mode of travel used by foreign travellers was road, involving 276 763 (63,9%) road travellers followed by air, involving 152 659 (35,3%) air travellers. Of the total number of foreign travellers departing by air, 112 265 (73,5%) departed from Johannesburg International Airport, 38 317 (25,1%) departed from Cape Town International Airport, 1 298 (0,9%) used Durban International Airport and the rest, 779 (0,5%), departed through other airports. Figure 1 shows the breakdown of air arrivals and departures according to the airport used.

Ports of entry and mode of travel used by overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

Overseas travellers

Of the total overseas air arrivals during February 2002, 100 484 (70,7%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport.

During February 2002, 164 721 overseas travellers visited South Africa. The February 2002 figure represents an increase of 19,5% over the February 2001 figure of 137 802. The figures show that for February 2002, there were 142 093 air arrivals from overseas, which accounts for 86,3% of all overseas arrivals. Of these overseas air arrivals, 100 484 (70,7%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport; 40 060 (28,2%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport; 1 211 (0,9%) arrived through Durban International Airport and the rest, 338 (0,2%), arrived through other airports.

The number of overseas travellers arriving by road during February 2002 was 20 721 (12,6%). The number arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 1 907 (1,2%).

Travellers from mainland Africa

A total of 299 346 (92,4%) travellers arrived from mainland Africa by road and a further 24 163 (7,5%) arrived by air. Of these air arrivals, 22 724 (94,0%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport.

The total number of travellers who arrived in South Africa from mainland Africa during February 2002 was 324 014. Compared to the February 2001 figure of 304 153, this represents an increase of 6,5%. Of these travellers from mainland Africa, the number arriving by road was 299 346 (92,4%).

For the same month, there were 24 163 (7,5%) air arrivals from mainland Africa. Of these air arrivals, 22 724 (94,0%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport, 996 (4,1%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport, 92 (0,4%) arrived through Durban International Airport while the rest, 351 (1,5%), arrived through other airports. The number of travellers from mainland Africa arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 505 (0,2%).

Purpose of visit as stated by overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

Overseas travellers

In February 2002, 143 239 (87,0%) overseas travellers came to South Africa for holidays.

Of the 164 721 overseas travellers visiting South Africa during February 2002, 143 239 (87,0%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 13 049 (7,9%) stated that they were on a business trip. Overseas travellers on transit in South Africa numbered 4 579 (2,8%), those visiting for the purpose of work (including contract work) numbered 2 662 (1,6%) and those visiting for the purpose of study numbered 1 152 (0,7%).

Travellers from mainland Africa

In February 2002, 280 681 (86,6%) travellers from mainland Africa came to South Africa for holidays.

Of the 324 014 travellers from mainland Africa visiting South Africa during February 2002, 280 681 (86,6%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 23 722 (7,3%) stated that they were on a business trip. Those visiting for the purpose of study numbered 8 864 (2,7%), those visiting for the purpose of work (including contract work) numbered 6 243 (1,9%) and transit visitors numbered 4 241 (1,3%).

Duration of stay as stated by overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

Overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

In February 2002, of the 164 721 overseas travellers visiting South Africa 68 079 (41,3%) stated that they intended to stay in South Africa for 271 to 365 days.

In February 2002, 68 079 (41,3%) overseas travellers stated that they intended to stay in South Africa for 271 to 365 days and 33 748 (20,5%) stated that they intended to stay for 91 to 180 days. Of the 324 014 travellers from mainland Africa, 87 683 (27,1%) stated that they intended to stay in South Africa for 91 to 180 days and 48 824 (15,1%) stated that they intended to stay for 2 to 7 days.

Leading source countries of overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

Overseas travellers

In February 2002, the leading source country of overseas arrivals was the UK, 47 185 (28,6%) followed by Germany, 26 568 (16,1%) and the USA, 12 175 (7,4%).

During February 2002, the number of travellers from the UK visiting South Africa was 47 185 (28,6%), making it the leading country of origin of overseas travellers. This was followed by travellers from Germany, 26 568 (16,1%). The other main countries of origin of overseas travellers were: the USA, 12 175 (7,4%); the Netherlands, 8 940 (5,4%); France, 8 898 (5,4%); Australia, 4 867 (3,0%); Switzerland, 4 019 (2,4%) and Italy, 3 259 (2,0%). Upon comparing the figures for February 2002 with those of February 2001, the highest increase in the number of arrivals from these leading source countries was for Switzerland, (32,6% up from 3 032), as shown in Figure 2. The main stated purpose of visit for travellers coming from these leading source countries was holidays, followed by business.

Travellers from mainland Africa

The leading source country of travellers from mainland Africa in February 2002 was Lesotho, 87 406 (27,0%).

During February 2002, the top eight countries in mainland Africa from which travellers arriving in South Africa came, were: Lesotho, 87 406 (27,0%); Swaziland, 53 388 (16,5%); Botswana, 53 336 (16,5%); Zimbabwe, 46 292 (14,3%); Mozambique, 42 543 (13,1%); Namibia, 13 595 (4,2%); Zambia, 9 004 (2,8%) and Malawi, 7 000 (2,2%). When comparing arrival figures from mainland Africa, for 2001 and 2002, there was an increase in the number of travellers arriving from Zambia, (43,5% up from 6 276) and Botswana, (36,1% up from 34 025) as shown in Figure 3.

Departing South African residents

South African residents: Purpose of travel

During February 2002, South African residents travelled within mainland Africa more for business than for holidays (71,5% as opposed to 26,0%) and travelled overseas more for holidays than business (58,9% as opposed to 36,0%).

During February 2002, the total number of South African residents who departed 'temporarily' (through all ports of exit) was 244 792, an increase of 2,6% compared to the number of South African residents who departed temporarily during the same month in 2001. Of these departing South African residents, the number who travelled by air was 83 188 (34,0%). Of those who travelled by air and left through the three international airports of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban, 57 584 (69,2%) filled in departure forms. From the completed February 2002 departure forms, one can see that, on the whole, South African residents travelled within mainland Africa more for business than for holidays (26,0% as opposed to 71,5%) and travelled overseas more for holidays than business (58,9% as opposed to 36,0%).

South African residents: Destination countries

The two leading destinations for South African residents for February 2002 were the UK, 11 561 (20,1%) and the USA, 3 388 (5,9%).

The predominant mode of travel used by South African residents departing temporarily from South Africa in February 2002 was road, 161 116 (65,8%) followed by air 83 188 (34,0%).

For South African residents who departed temporarily in February 2002 using the three international airports as ports of exit, the leading countries of destination were the UK, 11 561 (20,1%); the USA, 3 388 (5,9%); Namibia, 3 080 (5,3%); Australia, 3 031 (5,3%); Botswana, 1 696 (2,9%); Germany, 1 647 (2,9%); Zambia, 1 646 (2,9%) and Zimbabwe, 1 611 (2,8%). Among these leading destination countries, Botswana showed a significant increase in the number of visiting South African residents during February 2002 as compared to February 2001, (95,2% up from 869) as shown in Figure 4.

Returning South African residents

The number of returning South African residents in February 2002 was 245 862, an increase of 3,5% compared to those returning during February 2001. The predominant mode of travel used by South African residents in returning to South Africa was road, 169 749 (69,0%) followed by air 75 621 (30,8%).

Of the South African residents returning by air, 64 263 (85,0%) used Johannesburg International Airport as port of reentry while 8 288 (11,0%) used Cape Town International Airport as port of re-entry. For the same month in 2002, the number of South African residents returning through Durban International Airport was 1 005 (1,3%) and through other airports 2 065 (2,7%).

Documented immigration and self-declared emigration

The five leading sources of documented immigrants to South Africa in February 2002 were: the UK, 73 (10,2%); India, 65 (9,1%); Nigeria, 56 (7,9%); China 48 (6,7%) and Zimbabwe 48 (6,7%). The five leading destination countries for self-declared emigrants during February 2002 were: the UK, 367 (29,3%); Australia, 251 (20,0%); New Zealand, 157 (12,5%); the USA, 92 (7,3%) and Namibia 46 (3,7%).

For the purpose of clarification, in the migration statistics published here, the emigration status reported refers to self-declared status. South Africans who leave permanently under the pretext of temporary visits will not appear as emigrants in the emigration statistics collected. Similarly, as per definition, 'undocumented immigrants' will not appear in the statistics collected. It is against this background that we report the migration statistics for February 2002.

The total number of self-declared emigrants departing through the three international airports was 1 252 in February 2002. For documented immigrants into South Africa, the total number approved as immigrants (either before or after arrival) was 713 for February 2002.

In February 2002, the leading source countries of documented immigrants were: the UK, 73 (10,2%); India, 65 (9,1%); Nigeria, 56 (7,9%); China 48 (6,7%) and Zimbabwe 48 (6,7%). The five leading destination countries for self-declared emigrants during February 2002 were: the UK, 367 (29,3%); Australia, 251 (20,0%); New Zealand, 157 (12,5%); the USA, 92 (7,3%) and Namibia 46 (3,7%) as shown in Figure 5.

Historical trends in tourism, immigration and self-declared emigration

It should be borne in mind that there is often quite a substantial month to month variation in tourism and migration figures, and one needs to look at a longer period of several months to be able to detect any trends and patterns. The trend regarding the number of overseas travellers arriving in South Africa since 1997 is shown in Figure 6. Although the figure shows evidence of seasonal fluctuations, the level of overseas tourism over the period has shown an upward trend. The historical trends in the number of immigrants and self-declared emigrants are shown in Figure 7. The Figure shows that since 1997, the number of documented immigrants has remained less than the number of self-declared emigrants. The gap between the two which has been closing down during the first half of 2001, has stopped doing so during the second half of 2001 and during the first two months of 2002.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Source of data and background

Legal movements across South African borders as well as legal immigration into South Africa fall under the jurisdiction of the Department of Home Affairs (DHA). Information on tourism and documented immigration are obtained from all ports of entry while the data on self-declared emigration statistics are obtained from only the three international airports of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban. Information on arrivals into and departures from South Africa are captured by DHA and loaded unto the mainframe at Bureau Nucleus. Stats SA accesses this data remotely, which is then used as part of the input data for this report. Information on emigration from South Africa and reason for temporary departure of South African residents is obtained from departure forms. The forms are sent to Stats SA on a weekly basis for data capture and processing. Lastly, information on legal immigrants to South Africa is sent to Stats SA on computer printout from DHA. The information on the printout is coded and captured by clerical staff at Stats SA.

Stats SA published complete emigration data up to and including December 1992. Since basic information on emigration was not available thereafter, it was not possible to publish data on emigration on a monthly basis for the period July 1993 to December 1993. However, as from 26 December 1993, the Department of Home Affairs implemented a system according to which South African residents departing for overseas from Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban International Airports complete departure forms. The system was implemented at these three airports only since approximately 97% of the emigrants left the country through these three ports. This system again made it possible to obtain and process information on South African tourists and emigrants leaving the country through these three ports as from December 1993.

Clarification of terms used in the tables

For foreign travellers, the category 'overseas total' excludes travellers from mainland Africa and from 'unspecified' countries.

Glossary of some terms used in tourism statistics

Tourism comprises the activities of persons travelling to and staying in places outside their usual environment for not more than one consecutive year for leisure, business and other purposes. The usual environment of a person consists of a certain area around his/her place of residence plus all other places s/he frequently visits.

A Tourist (overnight visitor) is a visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited. An **international tourist** is an international visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the country visited. A **domestic tourist** refers to a domestic visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited.

Traveller is any person on a trip between two or more localities. **An international traveller** refers to any person on a trip between two or more localities in different countries. **A domestic traveller** refers to any person on a trip between two or more localities in his/her country of residence.

Visitor refers to any person travelling to a place other than that of his/her usual environment for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

An international visitor is any person travelling to a country other than the one in which he/she has his/her usual residence, but outside his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

Domestic visitor refers to any person residing in a country, who travels to a place within that country other than the one in which s/he has his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

1.2.2 Arrivals by country of residence and purpose of visit
