#### KEY FINDINGS

THE NUMBER OF OVERSEAS FOREIGN TRAVELLERS VISITING THE RSA DURING JANUARY 2000 WAS 134 543, A DECREASE OF 4,2% AS COMPARED TO THE JANUARY 1999 FIGURE OF 140 456

#### Special note to the reader

After the application of similar set of exclusion rules used on the mainframe database (which is the source of the data used for producing this release) on the 'border post' database (used for producing the Advance Release of Tourism Statistics), we are pleased to inform the reader that the figures for January 2000 that were previously published in the 'Advance release' are now about 96% of the actual figures. This is to be expected since the mainframe database updates for late registrations and covers all seaports and smaller ports of entry.

On another note, during August 2000, Stats SA received additional 12 665 departure forms of RSA residents for the month of December 1999. The data have been captured and the updated December 1999 figures are included here in an Annexure. Steps are being taken to improve handling of filled-in departure forms.

### **Total foreign travellers: Summary**

The total number of foreign travellers (from overseas and from the rest of Africa) visiting the RSA during January 2000 increased by 1,5% from 513 989 in January 1999 to 521 423 in January 2000.

The total number of foreign travellers who visited the RSA from mainland Africa, overseas and

unspecified countries, arriving through all ports of entry during January 2000 was 521 423. The January 2000 figure represents an increase of 1,5% as compared with January 1999 figure of 513 989.

During January 2000, the most common mode of travel used by foreign travellers in arriving in South Africa was road, involving 373 978 (71,7%) trips followed by 132 904 (25,5%) air flights. Of the total number of foreign travellers arriving by air, 98 786 (74,3%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport while 32 469 (24,4%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport and 667 (0,5%) arrived through Durban International Airport.

Similarly, in departing from the RSA, the most common mode of travel used by foreign travellers was road, involving 307 595 (66,6%) trips followed by air flights, 147 257 (31,9%). Of the total number of foreign travellers departing by air, 108 549 (73,7%) departed using Johannesburg International Airport, 36 947 (25,1%) departed using Cape Town International Airport and 772 (0,5%) used Durban International Airport. Figure 1 shows the breakdown of air arrivals and departures according to the airpor used.

#### Ports of entry/mode of travel used by overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

#### Overseas travellers

Of the total overseas air arrivals during January 2000, 78 922 (71,0%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport.

During January 2000, 134 543 overseas travellers visited the RSA. The January 2000 figure represents a decrease of 4,2% over the January 1999 figure of 140 456. The figures show that for January 2000, there were 111 126 air arrivals from overseas which accounts for 82,6% of all overseas arrivals. Of these overseas air arrivals, 78 922 (71,0%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport; 31 267 (28,1%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport; 503 (0,5%) arrived through Durban International Airport and the rest, 434 (0,4%), arrived through other airports.

The number of overseas travellers arriving by road during January 2000 was 20 256 (15,1%). The numbe arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 3 161 (2,3%).

#### Travellers from mainland Africa

A total of 352 998 (94,0%) travellers arrived from mainland Africa by road and a further 20 909 (5,6%) arrived by air. Of these air arrivals, 19 050 (91,1%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport.

The total number of travellers who arrived in the RSA from mainland Africa during January 2000 was

375 641. Compared to the January 1999 figure of 360 222, this represents an increase of 3,0%. Of these travellers from mainland Africa, the number arriving by road was 352 998 (94,0%).

For the same month, there were 20 909 (5,6%) air arrivals from mainland Africa. Of these air arrivals, 19 050 (91,1%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport, 1 185 (5,7%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport, 163 (0,8%) arrived through Durban International Airport while the rest, 511 (2,4%), arrived through other airports. The number of travellers from mainland Africa arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 1 734 (0,5%).

#### Purpose of visit as stated by overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

#### Overseas travellers

In January 2000, 106 941 (79,5%) overseas travellers came to the RSA for holidays.

Of the 134 543 overseas travellers visiting the RSA during January 2000, 106 941 (79,5%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 14 023 (10,4%) stated that they were on a business trip. Overseas travellers on transit in the RSA numbered 6 221 (4,6%), those visiting for the purpose of study numbered 2 297 (1,7%) and those visiting for the purpose of work (including contract work) numbered 3 030 (3,7%).

#### Travellers from mainland Africa

In January 2000, 317 258 (84,5%) travellers from mainland Africa came to the RSA for holidays.

Of the 375 641 travellers from mainland Africa visiting the RSA during January 2000, 317 258 (84,5%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 32 869 (8,8%) stated that they were on a business trip. Transit visitors numbered 7 355 (2,0%), those visiting for the purpose of study numbered 7 697 (2,0%) and those visiting for the purpose of work (including contract work) numbered 9 971 (2,7%).

Leading source countries of overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

#### Overseas travellers

In January 2000, the leading source country of overseas arrivals was the UK, 32 408 (24,1%) followed by Germany 18 661 (13,9%) and the USA, 12 046 (9,0%).

During January 2000, the number of travellers from the UK visiting the RSA was 32 408 (24,1%), making it the leading country of origin of overseas travellers. This was followed by travellers from

Germany, 18 661 (13,9%). The other main countries of origin of overseas travellers were: the USA, 12 046 (9,0%), France, 7 756 (5,8%), the Netherlands, 6 798 (5,1%), Australia, 4 733 (3,5%), Switzerland, 3 903 (2,9%) and Belgium, 2 611 (1,9%). Upon comparing the figures for January 2000 with those of January 1999, the highest increase in the number of arrivals from these leading source countries was for Belgium, (17,0% up from 2 232) and Germany, (2,6% up from 18 192), as shown in Figure 2. The main stated purpose of visit for travellers coming from these leading source countries was holidays, followed by business.

#### Travellers from mainland Africa

The leading source country of travellers from mainland Africa in January 2000 was Lesotho, 153 856 (41,0%).

During January 2000, the top eight countries in mainland Africa from which travellers arriving in the RSA came, were: Lesotho, 153 856 (41,0%), Swaziland, 63 067 (16,8%), Botswana, 43 464 (11,6%), Mozambique, 43 842 (11,7%), Zimbabwe, 32 143 (8,6%), Namibia, 16 714 (4,4%), and Zambia, 5 893 (1,6%). When comparing arrival figures from mainland Africa, for 1999 and 2000, there were increases in the number of travellers arriving from Lesotho, (11,5% up from 138 018), Mozambique, (4,8% up from 41 847), Botswana, (7,0% up from 40 634), Namibia, (9,1% up from 15 321), Malawi, (9,6% up from 5 716) and Zambia, (4,3% up from 5 652), as shown in Figure 3. For the same comparison period, of the leading mainland African countries, those that had decreases in the number of arriving travellers were Swaziland, (9,7% down from 69 858) and Zimbabwe, (0,1% down from 32 180)

### **Departing South African residents**

South African residents: Purpose of travel

During January 2000, South African residents travelled within mainland Africa more for business than for holidays (61,2% as opposed to 37,8%) and similarly, they travelled overseas more for holidays than business (64,0% as opposed to 30,9%).

During January 2000, the total number of South African residents who departed 'temporarily' (through all ports of exit) was 403 446, an increase of 7,6% compared to the number of South African residents who departed temporarily during the same month in 1999. Of these departing South African residents, the number who travelled by air was 93 658 (33,1%) in January 2000. Of those who travelled by air and left through the three international airports of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban, 57 046 (60,9%) filled in departure forms. From the completed January 2000 departure forms, one can see that, on the whole, South African residents travelled within mainland Africa more for business than holidays (61,2% as opposed to 37,8%) and travelled overseas more for holidays than business (64,0% as opposed to 30,9%).

South African residents: Destination countries

The two leading destinations for South African residents for January 2000 were the UK, 12 553 (22,0%) and the USA, 5 200 (9,1%).

The predominant mode of travel used by South Africans departing temporarily from the RSA in January 2000 was road, 188 354 (66,6%) followed by air, 93 658 (33,1%).

For South African residents who departed temporarily in January 2000 using the three international airports as ports of exit, the leading countries of destination were the UK, 12 553 (22,0%), the USA, 5 200 (9,1%), Australia, 2 622 (4,6%), Namibia, 2 541 (4,5%), Zimbabwe, 2 176 (3.8%), Mauritius, 1 924 (3,4%), Germany, 1 671 (2,9%) and Mozambique, 1 229 (2,2%). As shown in Figure 4, among these leading destination countries, those that had decreases in the number of visiting South African residents during January 2000 as compared to January 1999, were: Mauritius, (45,2% down from 2 793), Zimbabwe, (91,9% down from 4176), the USA, (10,8% down from 5 763), Australia, (31,2% down from 3 441), Mozambique, (17,5% down from 1 444), Germany, (14,7% down from 1 917), the UK (2,0% down from 12 810), and Namibia, (17,2% down from 2 977).

#### **Returning South African residents**

The number of returning South African residents in January 2000 was 403 446, an increase of 7,6% compared to those returning during January 1999. The predominant mode of travel used by South African in returning to the RSA was road, 282 977 (70,1%) followed by air 117 911 (29,2%).

Of the South African residents returning by air, 97 520 (82,7%) used Johannesburg International Airport as port of re-entry while 14 781 (12,5%) used Cape Town International Airport as port of re-entry. For the same month in 2000, the number of South African residents returning through Durban International Airport was 3 523 (3,0%).

### Documented immigration and self-declared emigration

The four leading sources of documented immigrants to the RSA in January 2000 were, Zimbabwe, 27 (9,8%), Lesotho, 24 (8,7%), India, 21 (7,6%) and China, 20 (7,3%). The four leading destination countries for self-declared emigrants during January 2000 were the UK, 298 (23,6%), Australia, 241 (19,1%), New Zealand, 174 (13,8%) and the USA, 133 (10,5%).

For the purpose of clarification, in the migration statistics published here, the emigration status reported refers to self-declared status. South Africans who leave permanently under the pretext of temporary visits will not appear as emigrants in the emigration statistics collected. Similarly, as per definition, 'undocumented immigrants' will not appear in the statistics collected. It is against this background that we report the migration statistics for January 2000.

The number of self-declared emigrants departing through the three international airports was 1 263 in January 2000. For documented immigrants into the RSA, the number approved as immigrants (either before or after arrival) was 275 for January 2000.

In January 2000, the leading source countries of documented immigrants were: Zimbabwe, 27 (9,8%), Lesotho, 24 (8,7%), India, 21 (7,6%), China, 20 (7,3%), Germany 15 (5,5%) and the UK, 14 (5,1%). For the same month in 2000, the leading destination countries for self-declared emigrants were; the UK, 298 (23,6%), Australia, 241 (19,1%), New Zealand, 174 (13,8%), the USA, 133 (10,5%), Canada, 68 (5,4%) and Namibia, 47 (3,7%) as shown in Figure 5.

#### Historical trends in tourism, immigration and self-declared emigration

It should be borne in mind that there is often quite a substantial month to month variation in tourism and migration figures, and one needs to look at a longer period of several months to be able to detect any trends and patterns. The trend regarding the number of overseas travellers arriving in the RSA since 1994 is shown in Figure 6. Although the figure shows evidence of seasonal fluctuations, the level of overseas tourism over the period has shown an upward trend. The historical trends in the number of immigrants are self-declared emigrants are shown in Figure 7. The figure shows that since 1994, the number of documented immigrants has remained less than the number of self-declared emigrants. The gap between the two has been narrowing down since the second half of 1999.

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### Source of data and background

Legal movements across South African borders as well as legal immigration into South Africa fall under the jurisdiction of the Department of Home Affairs (DHA). Information on tourism and documented immigration are obtained from all ports of entry while the data on self-declared emigration statistics are obtained from only the three international airports of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban. Information on arrivals into and departures from the RSA are captured by DHA and loaded unto the mainframe at Bureau Nucleus. Stats SA accesses this data remotely, which is then used as part of the input data for this report. Information on emigration from the RSA and reason for temporary departure of South African residents is obtained from departure forms. The forms are sent to Stats SA on a weekly basis for data capture and processing. Lastly, information on legal immigrants to the RSA is sent to Stats SA on computer printout from DHA. The information on the printout is coded and captured by clerical staff at Stats SA.

Stats SA published complete emigration data up to and including December 1992. Since basic information on emigration was not available thereafter, it was not possible to publish data on emigration on a monthly basis for the period May 1993 to November 1993. However, as from 26 November 1993,

the Department of Home Affairs implemented a system according to which South African residents departing for overseas from Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban International Airports complete departure forms. The system was implemented at these three airports only since approximately 97% of the emigrants left the country through these three ports. This system again made it possible to obtain and process information on South African tourists and emigrants leaving the country through these three ports as from November 1993.

#### Clarification of terms used in the tables

For foreign travellers, the category "overseas total" excludes travellers from mainland Africa and from "unspecified" countries.

#### Glossary of some terms used in tourism statistics

**Tourism** comprises the activities of persons travelling to and staying in places outside their usual environment for not more than one consecutive year for leisure, business and other purposes. The usual environment of a person consists of a certain area around his/her place of residence plus all other places s/he frequently visits.

A Tourist (overnight visitor) is a visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited. An <u>international tourist</u> is an international visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the country visited. A **domestic tourist** refers to a domestic visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited.

**Traveller** is any person on a trip between two or more localities. **An international traveller refers** to any person on a trip between two or more localities in different countries. **A domestic traveller** refers to any person on a trip between two or more localities in his/her country of residence.

**Visitor** refers to any person travelling to a place other than that of his/her usual environment for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

An international visitor is any person travelling to a country other than the one in which he/she has his/her usual residence, but outside his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

**Domestic visitor** refers to any person residing in a country, who travels to a place within that country other than the one in which s/he has his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.
