KEY FINDINGS

THE NUMBER OF OVERSEAS FOREIGN TRAVELLERS VISITING SOUTH AFRICA DURING JUNE 2000 WAS 87 023, AN INCREASE OF 9,0% AS COMPARED TO THE JUNE

1999 FIGURE OF 79 813.

Total foreign travellers: Summary

The total number of foreign travellers (from overseas and from the rest of Africa) visiting South Africa during June 2000 increased by 4,7% from 416 745 in June 1999 to 436 514 in June 2000.

The total number of foreign travellers who visited South Africa from mainland Africa, overseas and unspecified countries, arriving through all ports of entry during June 2000 was 436 514. The June 2000 figure represents an increase of 4,7% as compared with June 1999 figure of 416 745.

During June 2000, the most common mode of travel used by foreign travellers in arriving in South Africa was road, involving 331 749 (76,0%) road travellers followed by 94 598 (21,7%) air travellers. Of the total number of foreign travellers arriving by air, 80 538 (85,1%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport while 12 319 (13,0%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport and 628 (0,7%) arrived through Durban International Airport.

Similarly, in departing from the RSA, the most common mode of travel used by foreign travellers was road, involving 308 943 (75,3%) road travellers followed by 96 334 (23,5%) air travellers. Of the total number of foreign travellers departing by air, 80 765 (83,8%) departed using Johannesburg International Airport, 13 596 (14,1%) departed using Cape Town International Airport and 687 (0,7%) used Durban International Airport. Figure 1 shows the breakdown of air arrivals and departures according to the airport used.

Ports of entry/mode of travel used by overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

Overseas travellers

Of the total overseas air arrivals during June 2000, 60 340 (82,9%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport.

During June 2000, 87 023 overseas travellers visited the RSA. The June 2000 figure represents an increase of 9,0% over the June 1999 figure of 79 813. The figures show that for June 2000, there were 72 827 air arrivals from overseas which accounts for 83,7% of all overseas arrivals. Of these overseas air arrivals, 60 340 (82,9%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport; 11 388 (15,6%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport; 478 (0,7%) arrived through Durban International Airport and the rest, 621 (0,9%), arrived through other airports.

The number of overseas travellers arriving by road during June 2000 was 12 876 (14,8%). The number arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 1 320 (1,5%).

Travellers from mainland Africa

A total of 317 818 (93,6%) travellers arrived from mainland Africa by road and a further 21 013 (6,2 %) arrived by air. Of these air arrivals, 19 581 (93,2%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport.

The total number of travellers who arrived in South Africa from mainland Africa during June 2000 was 339 730. Compared to the June 1999 figure of 326 226, this represents an increase of 4,1%. Of these travellers from mainland Africa, the number arriving by road was 317 818 (93,6%).

For the same month, there were 21 013 (6,2%) air arrivals from mainland Africa. Of these air arrivals, 19 581 (93,2%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport, 901 (4,3%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport, 148 (0,7%) arrived through Durban International Airport while the rest, 383 (1,8%), arrived through other airports. The number of travellers from mainland Africa arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 899 (0,3%).

Purpose of visit as stated by overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

Overseas travellers

In June 2000, 63 447 (72,9%) overseas travellers came to South Africa for holidays.

Of the 87 023 overseas travellers visiting South Africa during June 2000, 63 447 (72,9%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 14 237 (16,4%) stated that they were on a business trip. Overseas travellers on transit in South Africa numbered 5 339 (6,1%), those visiting for the purpose of study numbered 444 (0,5%) and those visiting for the purpose of work (including contract work) numbered 3 489 (4,0%).

Travellers from mainland Africa

In June 2000, 295 720 (87,0%) travellers from mainland Africa came to South Africa for holidays.

Of the 339 730 travellers from mainland Africa visiting South Africa during June 2000, 295 720 (87,0%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 30 784 (9,1%) stated that they were on a business trip. Transit visitors numbered 5 508 (1,6%), those visiting for the purpose of study numbered 1 978 (0,6%) and those visiting for the purpose of work (including contract work) numbered 5 584 (1,6%).

Leading source countries of overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa

Overseas travellers

In June 2000, the leading source country of overseas arrivals was the USA, 17 402 (21,8%) followed by the UK, 16 980 (21,3%) and Germany, 7 662 (9,6%) .

During June 2000, the number of travellers from the USA visiting South Africa was 17 402 (21,8%), making it the leading country of origin of overseas travellers. This was followed by travellers from the UK, 16 980 (21,3%). The other main countries of origin of overseas travellers were: Germany, 7 662 (9,6%), Australia, 4 297 (5,4%), France, 4 026 (5,0%), the Netherlands, 3 369 (4,2%), Portugal, 1 829 (2,3%) and Canada, 1 755 (2,2%). Upon comparing the figures for June 2000 with those of June 1999, the highest increase in the number of arrivals from these leading source countries was for France, (15,5% up from 3 486), as shown in Figure 2. The main stated purpose of visit for travellers coming from these leading source countries was holidays, followed by business.

Travellers from mainland Africa

The leading source country of travellers from mainland Africa in June 2000 was Lesotho, 125 461 (36,9%).

During June 2000, the top eight countries in mainland Africa from which travellers arriving in South Africa came, were: Lesotho, 125 461 (36,9%), Swaziland, 60 963 (17,9%), Botswana, 42 606 (12,5%), Mozambique, 41 131 (12,1%), Zimbabwe, 36 915 (10,9%), Namibia, 13 649 (4,0%), Zambia, 5 945 (1,7%) and Malawi, 5 254 (1,5%). When comparing arrival figures from mainland Africa, for 1999 and 2000, there were increases in the number of travellers arriving from Malawi, (19,1% up from 411), Zambia, (17,7% up from 5 049), Botswana, (11,6% up from 38 176), Namibia, (10,0% up from 12 411), Mozambique, (8,2% up from 37 998) and Zimbabwe, (3,0% up from 35 846) as shown in Figure 3.

Departing South African residents

South African residents: Purpose of travel

During June 2000, South African residents travelled within mainland Africa more for business than for holidays (58,8% as opposed to 38,4%) and similarly, they travelled overseas more for holidays than business (78,5% as opposed to 18,5%).

During June 2000, the total number of South African residents who departed 'temporarily' (through all ports of exit) was 366 460, an increase of 8,9% compared to the number of South African residents who departed temporarily during the same month in 1999. Of these departing South African residents, the number who travelled by air was 140 737 (38,4%). Of those who travelled by air and left through the

three international airports of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban, 58 301 (41,4%) filled in departure forms. From the completed June 2000 departure forms, one can see that, on the whole, South African residents travelled within mainland Africa more for business than holidays (58,8% as opposed to 38,4%) and travelled overseas more for holidays than business (78,5% as opposed to 18,5%).

South African residents: Destination countries

The two leading destinations for South African residents for June 2000 were the UK, 19 959 (34,2%) and the USA, 6 960 (11,9%).

The predominant mode of travel used by South Africans departing temporarily from South Africa in June 2000 was road, 224 767 (61,3%) followed by air 140 737 (38,4%).

For South African residents who departed temporarily in June 2000 using the three international airports as ports of exit, the leading countries of destination were the UK, 19 959 (34,2%), the USA, 6 960 (11,9%), Namibia, 3 700 (6,3%), Germany, 3 161 (5,4%), Australia, 1 998 (3,4%), Mauritius, 1 893 (3,2%) and Portugal, 1 869 (3,2%). Among these leading destination countries, Mauritius showed a significant decrease in the number of visiting South African residents during June 2000 as compared to June 1999, (65,9% down from 3 141) as shown in Figure 4.

Returning South African residents

The number of returning South African residents in June 2000 was 305 862, an increase of 10,3% compared to those returning during June 1999. The predominant mode of travel used by South Africans returning to South Africa was road, 207 920 (68,0%) followed by air 97 159 (31,8%).

Of the South African residents returning by air, 80 164 (82,5%) used Johannesburg International Airport as port of re-entry while 13 053 (13,4%) used Cape Town International Airport as port of re-entry. For the same month in 2000, the number of South African residents returning through Durban International Airport was 1 259 (1,3%) and through other airports 2 683 (2,8%).

Documented immigration and self-declared emigration

The four leading sources of documented immigrants to South Africa in June 2000 were: Rep of China (Taiwan), 33 (22,3%), the UK, 20 (13,5%), the USA, 20 (13,5%) and Germany, 9 (6,1%). The four leading destination countries for self-declared emigrants during June 2000 were: the UK, 190 (31,1%), Australia, 85 (13,9%), USA, 82 (13,4%) and New Zealand, 42(6,9%).

For the purpose of clarification, in the migration statistics published here, the emigration status reported refers to self-declared status. South Africans who leave permanently under the pretext of temporary visits

will not appear as emigrants in the emigration statistics collected. Similarly, as per definition, 'undocumented immigrants' will not appear in the statistics collected. It is against this background that we report the migration statistics for June 2000.

The number of self-declared emigrants departing through the three international airports was 610 in June 2000. For documented immigrants into the RSA, the number approved as immigrants (either before or after arrival) was 148 for June 2000.

In June 2000, the leading source countries of documented immigrants were: Rep of China (Taiwan), 33 (22,3%), the UK 20 (13,5%), the USA, 20 (13,5%) and Germany, 9 (6,1%). The four leading destination countries for self-declared emigrants during June 2000 were: the UK, 190 (31,1%), Australia, 85 (13,9%), USA, 82 (13,4%) and New Zealand, 42 (6,9%) as shown in Figure 5.

Historical trends in tourism, immigration and self-declared emigration

It should be borne in mind that there is often quite a substantial month to month variation in tourism and migration figures, and one needs to look at a longer period of several months to be able to detect any trends and patterns. The trend regarding the number of overseas travellers arriving in South Africa since 1994 is shown in Figure 6. Although the figure shows evidence of seasonal fluctuations, the level of overseas tourism over the period has shown an upward trend. The historical trends in the number of immigrants and self-declared emigrants are shown in Figure 7. The figure shows that since 1994, the number of documented immigrants has remained less than the number of self-declared emigrants. The gap between the two which has been narrowing down since the second half of 1999, has been widening apart during the first half of 2000.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Source of data and background

Legal movements across South African borders as well as legal immigration into South Africa fall under the jurisdiction of the Department of Home Affairs (DHA). Information on tourism and documented immigration are obtained from all ports of entry while the data on self-declared emigration statistics are obtained from only the three international airports of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban. Information on arrivals into and departures from South Africa are captured by DHA and loaded onto the mainframe at Bureau Nucleus. Stats SA accesses this data remotely, which is then used as part of the input data for this report. Information on emigration from South Africa and reason for temporary departure of South African residents is obtained from departure forms. The forms are sent to Stats SA on a weekly basis for data capture and processing. Lastly, information on legal immigrants to South Africa is sent to Stats SA on computer printout from DHA. The information on the printout is coded and captured by clerical staff at Stats SA.

Stats SA published complete emigration data up to and including December 1992. Since basic information on emigration was not available thereafter, it was not possible to publish data on emigration on a monthly basis for the period June 1993 to November 1993. However, as from 26 November 1993, the Department of Home Affairs implemented a system according to which South African residents departing for overseas from Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban International Airports complete departure forms. The system was implemented at these three airports only since approximately 97% of the emigrants left the country through these three ports. This system again made it possible to obtain and process information on South African tourists and emigrants leaving the country through these three ports as from November 1993.

Clarification of terms used in the tables

For foreign travellers, the category "overseas total" excludes travellers from mainland Africa and from "unspecified" countries.

Meanings of symbols used in the tables

- = nil

.. = not applicable

? = unspecified

Glossary of some terms used in tourism statistics

Tourism comprises the activities of persons travelling to and staying in places outside their usual environment for not more than one consecutive year for leisure, business and other purposes. The usual environment of a person consists of a certain area around his/her place of residence plus all other places s/he frequently visits.

A Tourist (overnight visitor) is a visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited. An international tourist is an international visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the country visited. A **domestic tourist** refers to a domestic visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited.

Traveller is any person on a trip between two or more localities. **An international traveller refers** to any person on a trip between two or more localities in different countries. **A domestic traveller** refers to any person on a trip between two or more localities in his/her country of residence.

Visitor refers to any person travelling to a place other than that of his/her usual environment for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

An international visitor is any person travelling to a country other than the one in which he/she has his/her usual residence, but outside his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

Domestic visitor refers to any person residing in a country, who travels to a place within that country other than the one in which s/he has his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

Fig 1: Air arrivals and departures by port of entry, South Africa, June 2000

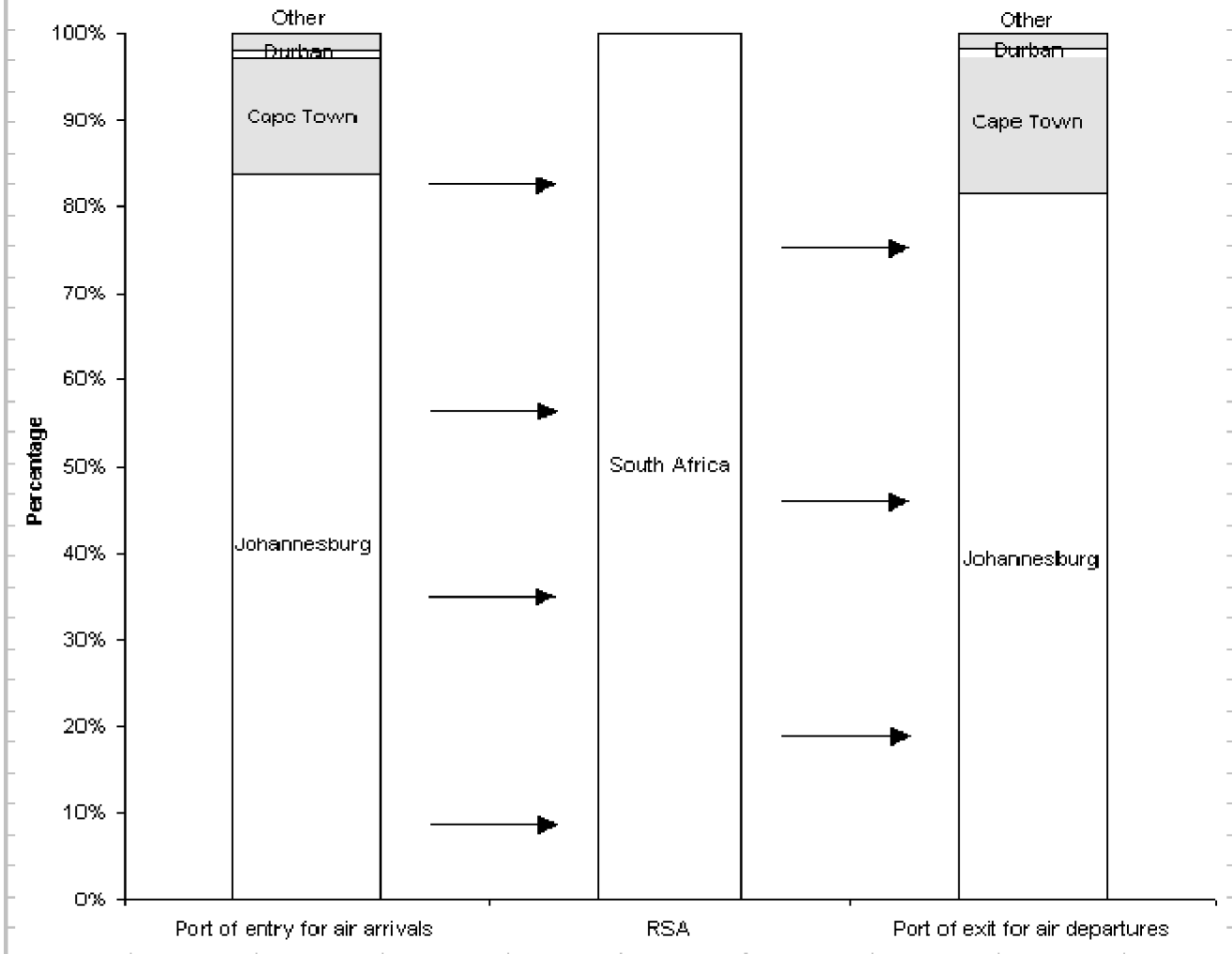


Fig 2: Percentage change in number of overseas travellers arriving from leading source countries in June 2000 compared with June 1999

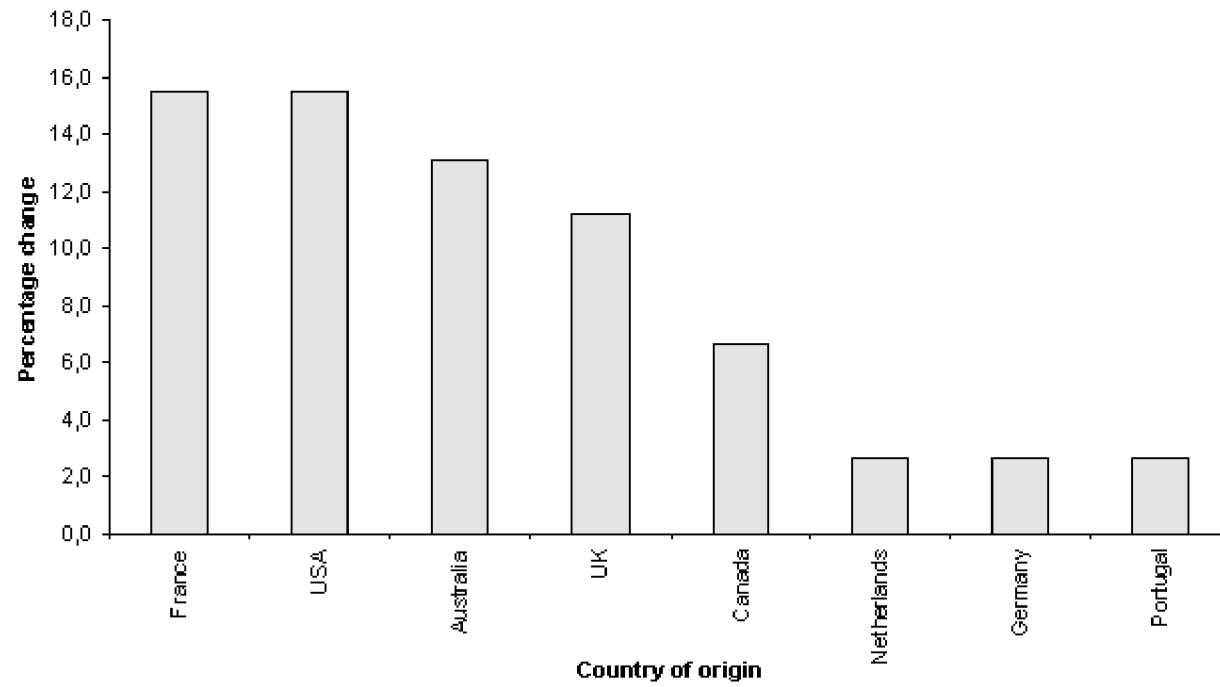


Fig 3: Percentage change in the number of travellers from mainland African countries arriving from leading source countries in June 2000 compared with June 1999

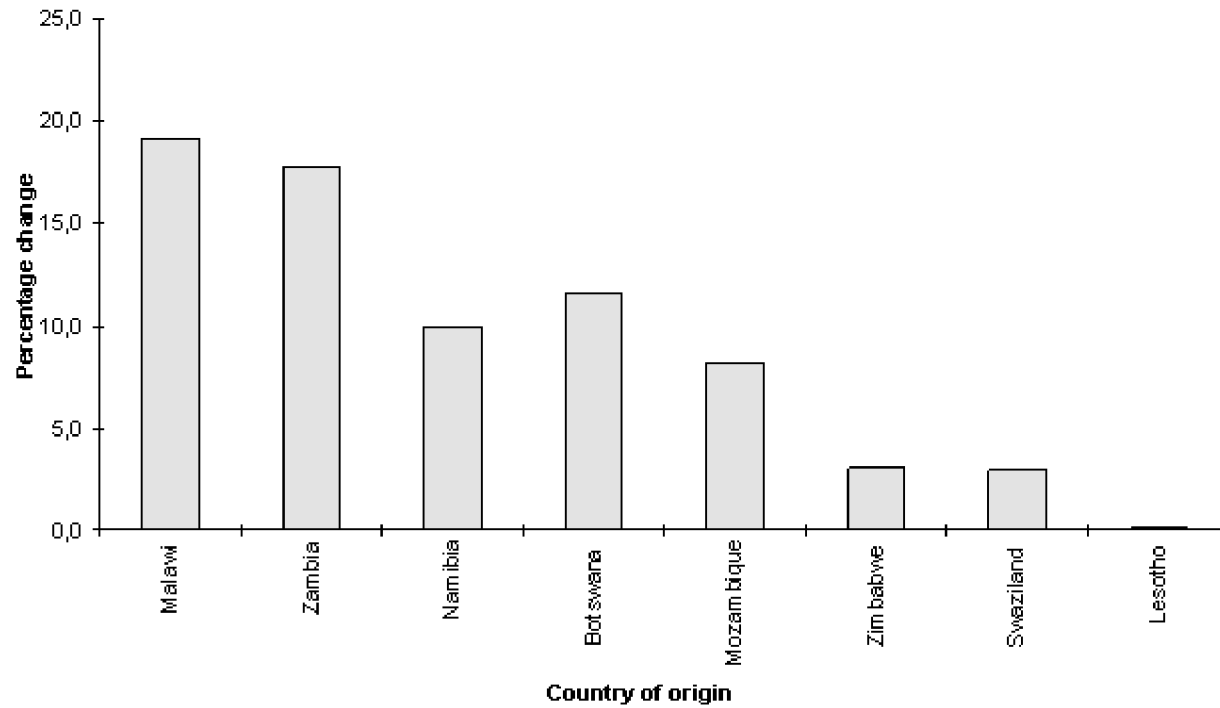


Fig 5: Documented immigrants to South Africa and self-declared emigrants from South Africa, June 2000

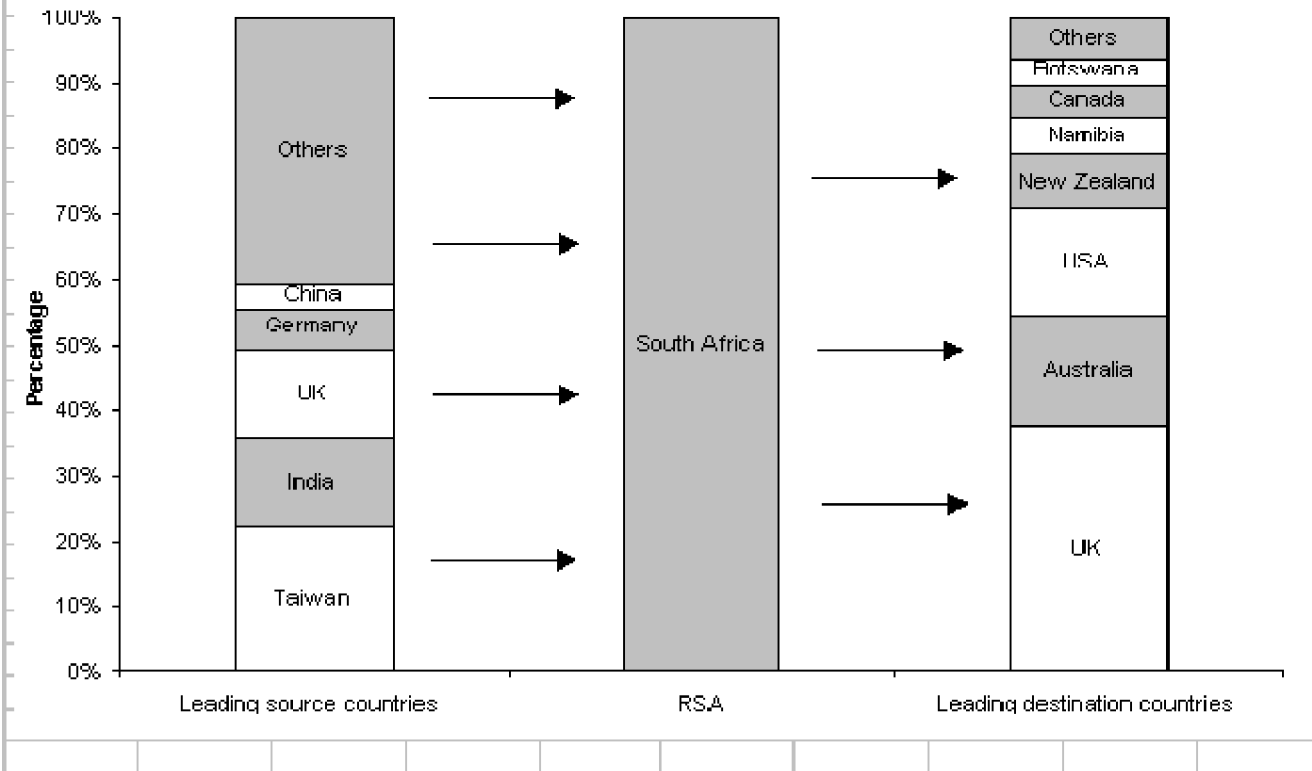
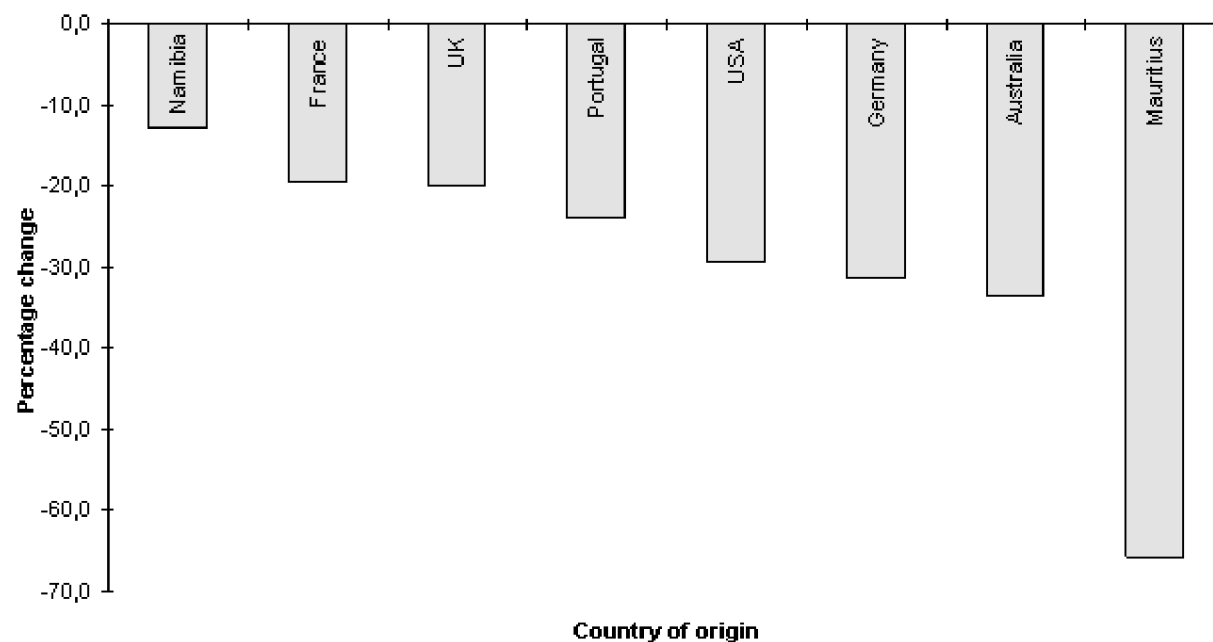


Fig 4: Percentage change in number of South African residents travelling to the leading destination countries in June 2000 compared with June 1999
