## KEY FINDINGS

***THE NUMBER OF OVERSEAS FOREIGN TRAVELLERS VISITING SOUTH AFRICA DURING MARCH 2002 WAS 172 559, AN INCREASE OF 22,9% AS COMPARED TO THE MARCH 2001 FIGURE OF 140 378.***

### **Total foreign travellers: Summary**

***The total number of foreign travellers (from overseas and from the rest of Africa) visiting South Africa during March 2002 increased by 13,3% from 491 111 in March 2001 to 556 569 in March 2002.***

The total number of foreign travellers who visited South Africa from mainland Africa, overseas and unspecified countries, arriving through all ports of entry during March 2002 was 556 569. The March 2002 figure represents an increase of 13,3% as compared with the March 2001 figure of 491 111.

During March 2002, the most common mode of travel used by foreign travellers in arriving in South Africa was road, involving 368 345 (66,2%) road travellers followed by air, involving 173 632 (31,2%) air travellers. Of the total number of foreign travellers arriving by air, 130 437 (75,1%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport while 41 335 (23,8%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport, 1 042 (0,6%) arrived through Durban International Airport and the rest, 818 (0,5%), arrived through other airports.

In departing from South Africa, the most common mode of travel used by foreign travellers was road, involving 318 483 (63,8%) road travellers followed by air, involving 176 158 (35,3%) air travellers. Of the total number of foreign travellers departing by air, 129 536 (73,5%) departed from Johannesburg International Airport, 44 466 (25,2%) departed from Cape Town International Airport, 1 048 (0,6%) used Durban International Airport and the rest, 1 108 (0,6%), departed through other airports. Figure 1 shows the breakdown of air arrivals and departures according to the airport used.

### **Ports of entry and mode of travel used by overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa**

#### **Overseas travellers**

***Of the total overseas air arrivals during March 2002, 104 720 (71,7%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport.***

During March 2002, 172 559 overseas travellers visited South Africa. The March 2002 figure represents an increase of 22,9% over the March 2001 figure of 140 378. The figures show that for March 2002, there were 145 994 air arrivals from overseas, which accounts for 84,6% of all overseas arrivals. Of these overseas air arrivals, 104 720 (71,7%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport; 39 963 (27,4%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport; 944 (0,6%) arrived through Durban International Airport and the rest, 367 (0,3%), arrived through other airports.

The number of overseas travellers arriving by road during March 2002 was 24 059 (13,9%). The number arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 2 506 (1,5%).

#### **Travellers from mainland Africa**

***A total of 343 835 (92,6%) travellers arrived from mainland Africa by road and a further 26 880 (7,2%) arrived by air. Of these air arrivals, 25 038 (93,1%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport.***

The total number of travellers who arrived in South Africa from mainland Africa during March 2002 was 371 377. Compared to the March 2001 figure of 337 891, this represents an increase of 9,9%. Of these travellers from mainland Africa, the number arriving by road was 343 835 (92,6%).

For the same month, there were 26 880 (7,2%) air arrivals from mainland Africa. Of these air arrivals, 25 038 (93,1%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport, 1 305 (4,9%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport, 97 (0,4%) arrived through Durban International Airport while the rest, 440 (1,6%), arrived through other airports. The number of travellers from mainland Africa arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 662 (0,2%).

### **Purpose of visit as stated by overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa**

#### **Overseas travellers**

*In March 2002, 150 607 (87,3%) overseas travellers came to South Africa for holidays.*

Of the 172 559 overseas travellers visiting South Africa during March 2002, 150 607 (87,3%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 12 898 (7,5%) stated that they were on a business trip. Overseas travellers on transit in South Africa numbered 5 295 (3,1%), those visiting for the purpose of work (including contract work) numbered 3 274 (1,9%) and those visiting for the purpose of study numbered 454 (0,3%).

#### **Travellers from mainland Africa**

*In March 2002, 329 900 (88,8%) travellers from mainland Africa came to South Africa for holidays.*

Of the 371 377 travellers from mainland Africa visiting South Africa during March 2002, 329 900 (88,8%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 24 637 (6,6%) stated that they were on a business trip. Those visiting for the purpose of study numbered 4 602 (1,2%), those visiting for the purpose of work (including contract work) numbered 5 773 (1,6%) and transit visitors numbered 6 304 (1,7%).

### **Duration of stay as stated by overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa**

#### **Overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa**

*In March 2002, of the 172 559 overseas travellers visiting South Africa 75 135 (43,5%) stated that they intended to stay in South Africa for 271 to 365 days.*

In March 2002, 75 135 (43,5%) overseas travellers stated that they intended to stay in South Africa for 271 to 365 days and 31 463 (18,2%) stated that they intended to stay for 91 to 180 days. Of the 371 377 travellers from mainland Africa, 85 348 (23,0%) stated that they intended to stay in South Africa for 91 to 180 days and 67 442 (18,2%) stated that they intended to stay for 32 to 90 days.

### **Leading source countries of overseas travellers and travellers from mainland Africa**

#### **Overseas travellers**

*In March 2002, the leading source country of overseas arrivals was the UK, 49 153 (28,5%) followed by Germany, 27 101 (15,7%) and the USA, 15 288 (8,9%).*

During March 2002, the number of travellers from the UK visiting South Africa was 49 153 (28,5%), making it the leading country of origin of overseas travellers. This was followed by travellers from Germany, 27 101 (15,7%). The other main countries of origin of overseas travellers were: the USA, 15 288 (8,9%); France, 9 513 (5,5%); the Netherlands, 7 412 (4,3%); Australia, 6 109 (3,5%); Switzerland, 3 639 (2,1%) and Italy, 3 083 (1,8%). Upon comparing the figures for March 2002 with those of March 2001, the highest increase in the number of arrivals from these leading source countries was for the UK, (46,4% up from 33 572), as shown in Figure 2. The main stated purpose of visit for travellers coming from these leading source countries was holidays, followed by business.

#### **Travellers from mainland Africa**

*The leading source country of travellers from mainland Africa in March 2002 was Lesotho, 88 787 (23,9%).*

During March 2002, the top eight countries in mainland Africa from which travellers arriving in South Africa came, were: Lesotho, 88 787 (23,9%); Botswana, 76 135 (20,5%); Swaziland, 67 453 (18,2%); Mozambique, 46 222 (12,4%); Zimbabwe, 45 047 (12,1%); Namibia, 19 287 (5,2%); Zambia, 9 196 (2,5%) and Malawi, 7 049 (1,9%). When comparing arrival figures from mainland Africa, for 2001 and 2002, there was an increase in the number of travellers arriving from Botswana, (60,9% up from 47 328) and Zambia, (30,3% up from 7 055) as shown in Figure 3.

## **Departing South African residents**

### **South African residents: Purpose of travel**

*During March 2002, South African residents travelled within mainland Africa more for business than for holidays (62,0% as opposed to 35,1%) and travelled overseas more for holidays than business (65,7% as opposed to 30,5%).*

During March 2002, the total number of South African residents who departed 'temporarily' (through all ports of exit) was 334 509, an increase of 16,4% compared to the number of South African residents who departed temporarily during the same month in 2001. Of these departing South African residents, the number who travelled by air was 103 312 (30,9%). Of those who travelled by air and left through the three international airports of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban, 57 584 (55,7%) filled in departure forms. From the completed March 2002 departure forms, one can see that, on the whole, South African residents travelled within mainland Africa more for business than for holidays (62,0% as opposed to 35,1%) and travelled overseas more for holidays than business (65,7% as opposed to 30,5%).

### **South African residents: Destination countries**

*The two leading destinations for South African residents for March 2002 were the UK, 10 277 (18,8%) and the USA, 3 770 (6,9%).*

The predominant mode of travel used by South African residents departing temporarily from South Africa in March 2002 was road, 230 261 (68,8%) followed by air 103 312 (30,9%).

For South African residents who departed temporarily in March 2002 using the three international airports as ports of exit, the leading countries of destination were the UK, 10 277 (18,8%); the USA, 3 770 (6,9%); Namibia, 3 386 (6,2%); Australia, 3 256 (5,9%); Germany, 1 602 (2,9%); Mozambique, 1 321 (2,4%); Zambia, 1 252 (2,3%) and Botswana, 1 208 (2,2%). Among these leading destination countries, Mozambique showed a significant increase in the number of visiting South African residents during March 2002 as compared to March 2001, (27,6% up from 1 035) as shown in Figure 4.

## **Returning South African residents**

The number of returning South African residents in March 2002 was 301 576, an increase of 8,0% compared to those returning during March 2001. The predominant mode of travel used by South African residents in returning to South Africa was road, 204 999 (68,0%) followed by air 95 889 (31,8%).

Of the South African residents returning by air, 81 383 (84,9%) used Johannesburg International Airport as port of re-entry while 10 852 (11,3%) used Cape Town International Airport as port of re-entry. For the same month in 2002, the number of South African residents returning through Durban International Airport was 1 465 (1,5%) and through other airports 2 189 (2,3%).

## **Documented immigration and self-declared emigration**

*The five leading sources of documented immigrants to South Africa in March 2002 were: India, 69 (14,1%); the UK, 53 (10,8%); China, 37 (7,6%); Zimbabwe 30 (6,1%) and Nigeria 29 (5,9%). The five leading destination countries for self-declared emigrants during March 2002 were: the UK, 301 (35,2%); Australia, 107 (12,5%); the USA, 96 (11,2%); New Zealand, 75 (8,8%) and Namibia, 38 (4,4%).*

For the purpose of clarification, in the migration statistics published here, the emigration status reported refers to self-declared status. South Africans who leave permanently under the pretext of temporary visits will not appear as emigrants in the emigration statistics collected. Similarly, as per definition, 'undocumented immigrants' will not appear in the statistics collected. It is against this background that we report the migration statistics for March 2002.

The total number of self-declared emigrants departing through the three international airports was 854 in March 2002. For documented immigrants into South Africa, the total number approved as immigrants (either before or after arrival) was 490 for March 2002.

In March 2002, the leading source countries of documented immigrants were India, 69 (14,1%); the UK, 53 (10,8%); China, 37 (7,6%); Zimbabwe 30 (6,1%) and Nigeria 29 (5,9%). The five leading destination countries for self-declared emigrants during March 2002 were: the UK, 301 (35,2%); Australia, 107 (12,5%); the USA, 96 (11,2%); New Zealand, 75 (8,8%) and Namibia, 38 (4,4%) as shown in Figure 5.

**Historical trends in tourism, immigration and self-declared emigration**

It should be borne in mind that there is often quite a substantial month to month variation in tourism and migration figures, and one needs to look at a longer period of several months to be able to detect any trends and patterns. The trend regarding the number of overseas travellers arriving in South Africa since 1997 is shown in Figure 6. Although the figure shows evidence of seasonal fluctuations, the level of overseas tourism over the period has shown an upward trend. The historical trends in the number of immigrants and self-declared emigrants are shown in Figure 7. The Figure shows that since 1997, the number of documented immigrants has remained less than the number of self-declared emigrants. The gap between the two which has been closing down during the first half of 2001, has stopped doing so during the second half of 2001 and during the first three months of 2002.

## EXPLANATORY NOTES

### Source of data and background

Legal movements across South African borders as well as legal immigration into South Africa fall under the jurisdiction of the Department of Home Affairs (DHA). Information on tourism and documented immigration are obtained from all ports of entry while the data on self-declared emigration statistics are obtained from only the three international airports of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban. Information on arrivals into and departures from South Africa are captured by DHA and loaded onto the mainframe at Bureau Nucleus. Stats SA accesses this data remotely, which is then used as part of the input data for this report. Information on emigration from South Africa and reason for temporary departure of South African residents is obtained from departure forms. The forms are sent to Stats SA on a weekly basis for data capture and processing. Lastly, information on legal immigrants to South Africa is sent to Stats SA on computer printout from DHA. The information on the printout is coded and captured by clerical staff at Stats SA.

Stats SA published complete emigration data up to and including December 1992. Since basic information on emigration was not available thereafter, it was not possible to publish data on emigration on a monthly basis for the period July 1993 to December 1993. However, as from 26 December 1993, the Department of Home Affairs implemented a system according to which South African residents departing for overseas from Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban International Airports complete departure forms. The system was implemented at these three airports only since approximately 97% of the emigrants left the country through these three ports. This system again made it possible to obtain and process information on South African tourists and emigrants leaving the country through these three ports as from December 1993.

### Clarification of terms used in the tables

For foreign travellers, the category 'overseas total' excludes travellers from mainland Africa and from 'unspecified' countries.

### Meanings of symbols used in the tables

- = nil

.. = not applicable

? = unspecified

### Glossary of some terms used in tourism statistics

**Tourism** comprises the activities of persons travelling to and staying in places outside their usual environment for not more than one consecutive year for leisure, business and other purposes. The usual environment of a person consists of a certain area around his/her place of residence plus all other places s/he frequently visits.

A **Tourist** (overnight visitor) is a visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited. An **international tourist** is an international visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the country visited. A **domestic tourist** refers to a domestic visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited.

**Traveller** is any person on a trip between two or more localities. An **international traveller** refers to any person on a trip between two or more localities in different countries. A **domestic traveller** refers to any person on a trip between two or more localities in his/her country of residence.

**Visitor** refers to any person travelling to a place other than that of his/her usual environment for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

An **international visitor** is any person travelling to a country other than the one in which he/she has his/her usual residence, but outside his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

**Domestic visitor** refers to any person residing in a country, who travels to a place within that country other than the one in which s/he has his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.
