1. Introduction

1.1 Sources of data

Legal movements across South African borders as well as legal immigration into South Africa fall under the jurisdiction of the Department of Home Affairs (DHA). Information on tourism and documented immigration are obtained from all ports of entry, while data on self-declared emigration are obtained from only the three international airports of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban. Information on arrivals into and departures from South Africa are captured by DHA and loaded onto the mainframe at State Information Technology Agency (SITA). Stats SA accesses this data remotely, which is then used as part of the input data for this report. Information on emigration from South Africa and reason for temporary departure of South African residents is obtained from departure forms from the three international airports. The forms are sent to Stats SA on a weekly basis for data capturing and processing. Lastly, information on legal immigrants to South Africa is sent to Stats SA on computer printout from DHA. The information on the printout is coded and captured by clerical staff at Stats SA.

South African departures and arrivals are no longer required to have their barcodes scanned at the ports of entry and exit, therefore, statistics on their departure and arrival is no longer available. This is due to the implementation of the Immigration Act (No. 13 of 2002) by DHA as from April 2003. The information on South Africans available in this release is received from the three international airports.

Stats SA published complete emigration data up to and including February 1992. Since basic information on emigration was not available thereafter, it was not possible to publish data on emigration on a monthly basis for the period September 1993 to December 1993. However, as from 26 February 1993, the Department of Home Affairs implemented a system according to which South African residents departing for overseas from Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban International Airports complete departure forms. The system was implemented at these three airports only since approximately 97% of the emigrants left the country through these three ports. This system again made it possible to obtain and process information on South African tourists and emigrants leaving the country through these three ports as from February 1993.

1.2 Glossary of terms

Key terms used in this release are defined as follows:

Tourism comprises the activities of persons travelling to and staying in places outside their usual environment for not more than one consecutive year for leisure, business and other purposes. The usual environment of a person consists of a certain area around his/her place of residence plus all other places s/he frequently visits.

A Tourist (overnight visitor) is a visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited. An **international tourist** is an international visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the country visited. A **domestic tourist** refers to a domestic visitor who stays at least one night in collective or private accommodation in the place visited.

Traveller is any person on a trip between two or more localities. **An international traveller** refers to any person on a trip between two or more localities in different countries. **A domestic traveller** refers to any person on a trip between two or more localities in his/her country of residence.

Visitor refers to any person travelling to a place other than that of his/her usual environment for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

An international visitor is any person travelling to a country other than the one in which s/he has his/her usual residence, but outside his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

Domestic visitor refers to any person residing in a country, who travels to a place within that country other than the one in which s/he has his/her usual environment, for less than 12 consecutive months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

Overseas traveller refers to a number of foreign travellers visiting South Africa, excluding travellers from mainland Africa and from 'unspecified' countries.

Foreign traveller refers to a person who resides outside SA and visits the country temporarily.

South African residents are persons residing in SA (South African citizens and persons with permanent residence) who leave the country temporarily.

Documented immigrants refer to residents of other countries who have been accepted as permanent residents in South Africa. The permanent residence status could be given either before or after arrival in South Africa.

Self-declared emigrants refer to South African residents who, at the time of departing from South Africa, state their intention to leave the country and reside permanently elsewhere.

2. Key findings

2.1 Foreign travellers

The total number of foreign travellers who visited South Africa from mainland Africa, overseas and unspecified countries, arriving through all ports of entry during September 2003 was 530 094. The September 2003 figure represents a decrease of 3,8% as compared with the September 2002 figure of 551 252.

During September 2003, the most common mode of travel used by foreign travellers arriving in South Africa was road, involving 363 406 (68,6%) travellers, followed by air, involving 152 909 (28,8%) travellers. Of the total number of foreign travellers arriving by air, 126 858 (83,0%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport while 24 290 (15,9%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport, 577 (0,4%) arrived through Durban International Airport and the rest, 1 184 (0,8%), arrived through other airports.

For the total number of foreign travellers departing, road constituted the most common mode of travel 331 515 (70,9%), then followed by air 135 350 (29,0%). Of the total number of foreign travellers departing by air, 112 383 (83,0%) departed from Johannesburg International Airport, 20 893 (15,4%) departed from Cape Town International Airport, 488 (0,4%) used Durban International Airport and the rest, 1 586 (1,2%), departed through other airports. Figure 1 shows the breakdown of air arrivals and departures according to the airport used.

2.2 Ports of entry and mode of travel used by overseas and mainland Africa travellers

2.2.1 Overseas travellers

During September 2003, 150 572 overseas travellers visited South Africa. The September 2003 figure represents a decrease of 2,6% over the September 2002 figure of 154 662. The figures show that for September 2003, there were 125 248 air arrivals from overseas, which accounts for 83,2% of all overseas arrivals. Of these overseas air arrivals, 101 079 (80,7%) arrived through Johannesburg International Airport; 23 056 (18,4%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport; 315 (0,3%) arrived through Durban International Airport and the rest, 798 (0,6%), arrived through other airports.

The number of overseas travellers arriving by road during September 2003 was 25 012 (16,6%). The number of travellers arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 312 (0,2%).

2.2.2 Mainland Africa travellers

The total number of travellers who arrived in South Africa from mainland Africa during September 2003 was 364 703, as compared to the September 2002 figure of 382 124, this represents a decrease of 4,6%. Of these travellers from mainland Africa, the number arriving by road was 337 760 (92,6%).

For the same month, there were 26 840 (7,4%) air travellers arriving from mainland Africa. Of these air arrivals

25 056 (93,4%) arrived through Johannesburg

International Airport, 1 166 (4,3%) arrived through Cape Town International Airport, 259 (1,0%) arrived through Durban International Airport while the rest, 359 (1,3%), arrived through other airports. The number of travellers from mainland Africa arriving by rail, sea and unspecified mode of travel was 103 (0,0%).

2.3 Purpose and duration of visit

Of the 150 572 overseas travellers visiting South Africa during September 2003, 136 199 (90,5%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 8 161 (5,4%) stated that they were on a business trip. Overseas travellers on transit in South Africa were 1 704 (1,1%) of the total number, those travellers arriving for the purpose of work (including contract work) were 3 559 (2,4%) and those visiting for the purpose of study were 888 (0,6%).

Mainland Africa travellers: Of the 364 703 travellers from mainland Africa visiting South Africa during September 2003, an overwhelming majority 329 744 (90,4%) stated that they were in South Africa for holidays while 13 340 (3,7%) stated that they were on a business trip. A further breakdown of travellers from mainland Africa was as follows: travellers in transit were 4 325 (1,2%), those visiting for the purpose of study were 8 869 (2,4%) and those travellers arriving for the purpose of work (including contract work) were 8 255 (2,3%).

2.4 Duration of stay as stated by overseas and mainland Africa travellers

Overseas and mainland Africa travellers: In September 2003, of the 150 572 overseas travelers visiting South Africa
107 674 (71,5%) stated that they intended to stay for 271 to 365 days and 13 526 (9,0%) stated that they intended to stay for 91 to 180 days. Of the 364 703 travellers from mainland Africa, 190 214 (52,2%) stated that they intended to stay in South Africa for 91 to 180 days and 50 074 (13,7%) stated that they intended to stay for 271 to 365 days.

2.5 Leading source countries of overseas and mainland Africa travellers

Overseas travellers: During September 2003, the number of travellers from the UK visiting South Africa was 30 025 (19,9%), making it the leading country of origin of overseas travellers. This was followed by travellers from Germany, 20 754 (13,8%); the USA, 15 853 (10,5%). The other main countries of origin of overseas travellers were: the Netherlands, 11 783 (7,8%); France, 7 815 (5,2%); Australia, 7 570 (5,0%); Italy, 4 191 (2,8%) and China, 4 160 (2,8%). Upon comparing the figures for September 2003 with those of September 2002, the highest increase in the number of arrivals from these leading source countries was for the China, (53,0% up from 2 719 in 2002), (Figure: 2). The main stated purpose of visit for travellers coming from these leading source countries was holidays, followed by business.

Travellers from mainland Africa: During September 2003, the top eight countries in mainland Africa from which travellers arriving in South Africa came, were: Lesotho, 98 974 (27,1%); Swaziland, 72 384 (19,8%); Botswana, 69 266 (19,0%); Zimbabwe, 40 406 (11,1%); Mozambique, 38 045 (10,4%); Namibia, 16 126 (4,4%); Zambia, 9 562 (2,6%) and Malawi,

7 646 (2,1%). When comparing arrival figures from mainland Africa, for 2002 and 2003, there was an increase in the number of travellers arriving from Swaziland, (7,0% up from 67 680) (Figure: 3).

2.6 Departing South African residents

2.6.1 Purpose of travel

There has been an insignificant increase in the number of departing air travellers who completed the departure forms. Of those air travellers who left through the three international airports of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban, 104 561 filled in departure forms. From the completed September 2003 departure forms, one can see that, on the whole, South African residents travelled within mainland Africa more for business than for holidays (59,8% versus 38,5%) and travelled overseas more for holidays than business (66,1% versus 30,8%).

2.7 Migration

2.7.1 Documented immigration and self-declared emigration

For the purpose of clarification, in the migration statistics published here, the emigration status reported refers to self-declared status. South Africans who leave permanently under the pretext of temporary visits will not appear as emigrants in the emigration statistics collected. Similarly, as per definition, 'undocumented immigrants' will not appear in the statistics collected. It is against this background that we report the migration statistics for September 2003.

The total number of self-declared emigrants who completed the departure forms at the three international airports in September 2003 was 1 380. For documented immigrants into South Africa, the total number approved as immigrants (either before or after arrival) was 713 for September 2003.

In September 2003, the leading source countries of documented immigrants were: Nigeria, 114 (16,0%); Zimbabwe, 86 (12,1%); the UK, 61 (8,6%); China, 49 (6,9%) and Pakistan, 31 (4,3%). The five leading destination countries for self-declared emigrants during September 2003 were: the UK, 441 (32,0%); Australia, 210, (15,2%); the USA, 95 (6,9%); Namibia, 57 (4,1%) and New Zealand, 57 (4,1%), (Figure: 4).

2.7.2 Historical trends in tourism, immigration and self-declared emigration

It should be borne in mind that there is often quite a substantial month to month variation in tourism and migration figures, and one needs to look at a longer period of several months to be able to detect any trends and patterns. The trend regarding the number of overseas travellers arriving in South Africa since 1999 is shown in Figure 5. Although the figure shows evidence of seasonal fluctuations, the level of overseas tourism over the period has shown an upward trend. The historical trends in the number of immigrants and self-declared emigrants are shown in Figure 6. The Figure shows that since 1999, the number of documented immigrants has remained less than the number of self-declared emigrants. However, the gap between the two trends is slowly opening up during the third quarter of 2003, as can be seen from the Figure.
