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Key findings for the year 2004

Income, expenditure and net profit

The total income for the construction industry in 2004 was R100 442 million. The main contributors to the total income were 'construction of buildings' with R33 117 million (33,0%), 'construction of civil engineering structures' with R27 478 million (27,4%), 'other building completions' with R10 625 million (10,6%) and 'other building installations' with R8 992 million (8,9%), (see table 1, page 2).

The total expenditure in the construction industry in 2004 was R96 375 million. The main contributors to the total expenditure were 'construction of buildings' with R32 037 million (33,2%), 'construction of civil engineering structures' with R26 746 million (27,8%), 'other building completions' with R10 221 million (10,6%) and 'other building installations' with R8 127 million (8,4%), (see table 1, page 2).

The net profit before tax in the construction industry in 2004 was R3 968 million. The main contributors to the net profit before tax were 'construction of buildings' with R1 083 million (27,3%), followed by 'construction of civil engineering structures' with R825 million (20,8%), 'other building installations' with R584 million (14,7%), 'other building completions' with R451 million (11,4%) and 'electrical contracting' with R253 million (6,4%), (see table1, page 2).

Employment, salaries and wages

The total number of people employed by the construction industry in 2004 was about 403 000. The major employers were 'construction of buildings' with about 126 000 employees (31,3%), followed by 'construction of civil engineering structures' with 89 000 (22,1%), 'other building completions' with 56 000 (13,9%) and 'electrical contracting' with 29 000 (7,2%), (see table 11, page 15).

The total gross salaries and wages paid to employees in the construction industry in 2004 was R16 162 million. The main contributors to the total gross salaries and wages were 'construction of civil engineering structures' with R4 537 million (28,1%), followed by 'construction of buildings' with R4 009 million (24,8%) and 'other building completions' with R1 757 million (10,9%), (see table 4 ,page 5).

Capital expenditure on new assets

The capital expenditure on new assets in the construction industry in 2004 amounted to R2 248 million. The major contributors to the total capital expenditure on new assets were 'construction of buildings' with R 567 million (25,2%), followed by 'construction of civil engineering structures' with R509 million (22,6%), 'renting of construction or demolition equipment with operator' with R372 million (16,6%), and 'other building completions' with R264 million (11,7%), (see table 1, page 2).

Explanatory notes

Background The results presented in this publication have been derived from the 2004 construction large sample survey. This is a periodic survey, which measures economic activity in the construction industry of the South African economy. This survey is based on a sample of private and public enterprises operating in the construction industry.

The sample was drawn from the new business register. The new business register is based mainly on the income tax (IT) and value-added tax (VAT) databases. All enterprises are legally bound to register for either VAT or IT or both. That is, enterprises that are registered for tax are included on the new business register, and hence were given a chance of selection in the sample for the survey.

- **Reference period** The information was collected from enterprises for their financial year, which ended on any date between 1 July 2003 and 30 June 2004. The last census of construction was conducted for the year 1994.
- **Purpose of the survey** The construction large sample survey is a periodic survey. It examines the construction activities within both the private and public businesses/organisations in the South African economy. Results of the survey are used in the compilation of South Africa's national accounts, e.g. the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and gross fixed capital information. These statistics are also used by the private sector in analysis of comparative business and industry performance.

- Classification by The 1993 edition of the *Standard Industrial Classification of all Economic Activities*(SIC), Fifth Edition, Report No. 09-09-02, was used to classify the statistical units in the survey. The SIC is based on the 1990 *International Standard Industrial Classification of all Economic Activities* (ISIC) with suitable adaptations for local conditions. Statistics in this publication are presented at SIC division (4-digit) level. Each enterprise is classified to an industry, which reflects its predominant activity.

Statistical unit The statistical unit for the collection of the information is an enterprise. An enterprise is a legal unit (or a combination of legal units) that includes and directly controls all functions necessary to carry out its production activities.

Size groups The enterprises are divided into four size groups according to the value of their 'business register' turnover. Large enterprises are enterprises with an annual 'business register' turnover of R26 million and more. Table A presents the size groups defined using the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) cut-off points,

A sample of approximately 8000 enterprises was drawn using stratified simple random sampling. The enterprises were first stratified at 4-digit level according to the SIC and then by size of enterprises. All large enterprises are completely enumerated. 'Business register' turnover was used as the measure of size for stratification.

Weighting methodology For those strata not completely enumerated, the weights to produce estimates are the inverse ratio of the sampling fraction, modified to take account of non-response in the survey. Stratum estimates are calculated and then aggregated with the completely enumerated stratum to form division estimates. These procedures, which are in line with international best practice, are described in more detail on the Stats SA website at www.statssa.gov.za/publications/publicationsearch.asp.

Relative standard Data presented in this publication are based on information obtained from a sample and are, therefore, subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if the data had been obtained from all enterprises in the construction industry in South Africa.

One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of enterprises was used. The relative standard error (RSE) provides an immediate indication of the percentage errors likely to have occurred due to sampling, and thus avoids the need to refer to the size of the estimate.

Non-sampling errors Inaccuracies may occur because of imperfections in reporting by enterprises and errors made in the collection and processing of the data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as non-sampling errors. Every effort is made to minimise non-sampling errors by careful design of questionnaires, testing them in pilot studies, editing reported data and implementing efficient operating procedures. Non-sampling errors occur in both sample surveys and census.

Comparability with previously published information The information in this statistical release and previous construction surveys is not strictly comparable. This large sample survey was conducted from a sample drawn from a new business register of **all** enterprises registered for either VAT or IT or both.. The new register has better coverage of the small and micro enterprises.

Glossary

Employees	Employees are those people employed by the business or organisation who received payment (in salaries, wages, commission, piece rates or payments in kind) for the last pay period ended on or before 30 June 2004.	
Enterprise	The enterprise is a legal entity or a combination of legal units that includes and directly controls all functions necessary to carry out its production activities.	
Full-time employees	Full-time employees are those employees (permanent, temporary or casual) who usually work for the agreed-upon hours for a full- time employee in a specific occupation. If agreed hours do not apply, employees are regarded as full-time employees if they work 35 hours or more per week.	
Industry	An industry is made up of enterprises engaged in the same or similar kinds of economic activity. Industries are defined in the System of National Accounts (SNA) in the same way as in the Standard Industrial Classification of all Economic Activities, Fifth Edition, Report No. 09-90-02 of January 1993 (SIC).	
Net profit or loss before tax	Net profit or loss before tax is derived as: Total income <i>plus</i> Closing stocks <i>minus</i> Total expenditure <i>minus</i> Opening stocks	
Part-time employees	Part-time employees are those employees (permanent, temporary or casual) who are not full-time employees as defined above or who normally work less than 35 hours per week.	
Statistical unit	A statistical unit is a unit about which statistics are tabulated, compiled or published. The statistical units are derived from and linked to the South African Revenue Service (SARS) administrative data.	
Salaries and wages	Salaries and wages are payments for ordinary time, standard or agreed hours and overtime hours during the financial year for all permanent, temporary, casual, managerial and executive employers and employees, before taxation and other deductions.	
Stratum	A stratum is constructed by concatenating the SIC classification and size group variables.
