Tourist accommodation (Preliminary)

July 2017

The results published today are based on a new sample. This is an annual procedure which typically affects the levels of tourist accommodation statistics. To avoid breaks in time series and to minimise revisions to historical growth rates, historical levels were revised (i.e. they were linked to the estimates based on the new sample).

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Results for July 2017

Measured in nominal terms (current prices), total income for the tourist accommodation industry increased by 2,9% in July 2017 compared with July 2016.

Income from accommodation increased by 4,9% year-on-year in July 2017, the result of a 1,4% decrease in the number of stay unit nights sold and a 6,4% increase in the average income per stay unit night sold.

In July 2017, the types of accommodation that recorded the highest year-on-year growth in income from accommodation were:

- caravan parks and camping sites (36,3%);
- 'other' accommodation (8,8%); and
- guest-houses and guest-farms (6,8%) see Table B.

The main contributors to the 4,9% year-on-year increase in income from accommodation in July 2017 were:

- 'other' accommodation (contributing 2,4 percentage points); and
- hotels (contributing 1,7 percentage points) see Table 6.

Income from accommodation increased by 4,6% in the three months ended July 2017 compared with the three months ended July 2016. The main contributors to this increase were:

- hotels (3,8% and contributing 2,5 percentage points); and
- 'other' accommodation (8,8% and contributing 2,3 percentage points) see Table C.

Figure 1 – Stay unit nights sold: year-on-year percentage change

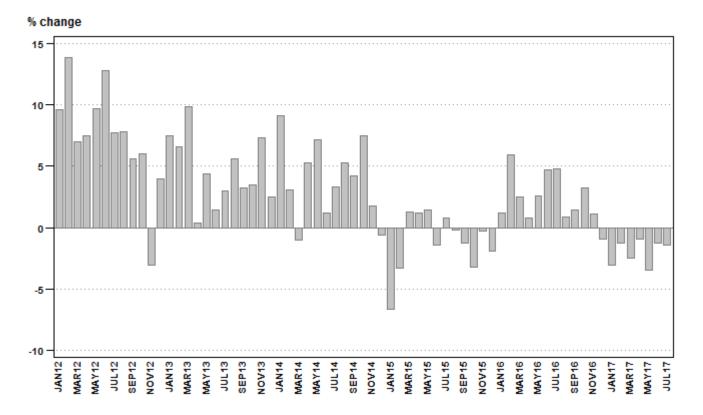
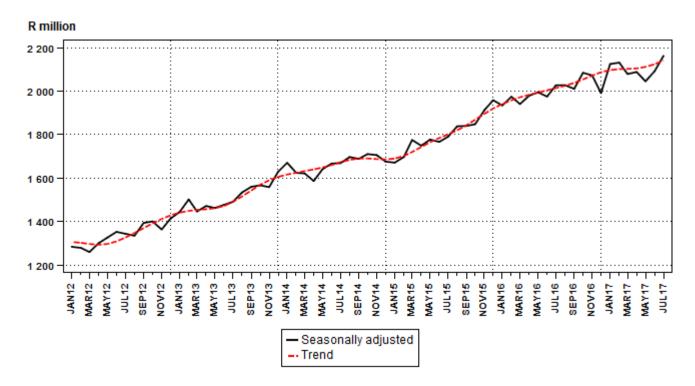


Figure 2 - Income from accommodation at current prices



Seasonally adjusted income from accommodation increased by 3,4% month-on-month in July 2017. The largest month-on-month growth rates were recorded for:

- guest-houses and guest-farms (24,2%); and
- caravan parks and camping sites (8,6%) see Table 7.

Business register and samples

Today Statistics South Africa (Stats SA) publishes results for the monthly survey of tourist accommodation from a new sample drawn in April 2017, which replaces the previous sample that was drawn in April 2016. The sample was drawn from a business register of enterprises with an annual turnover of at least R423 436 and that are required to register with the South African Revenue Service (SARS) for value added tax.

Owing to the evolving nature of business, the business register is maintained on a continuous basis. The maintenance process is aimed, amongst other things, at capturing changes related to new businesses, ceased businesses, merged businesses and classification changes. In addition, Stats SA undertakes quality improvement surveys related to the business register, the primary objective of which is to capture up-to-date information about the structures and activities of large and complex businesses. This process enables Stats SA to review classification codes for these businesses. These changes are an essential part of the statistical architecture.

Comparison between the previous (revised) and new samples for the tourist accommodation industry

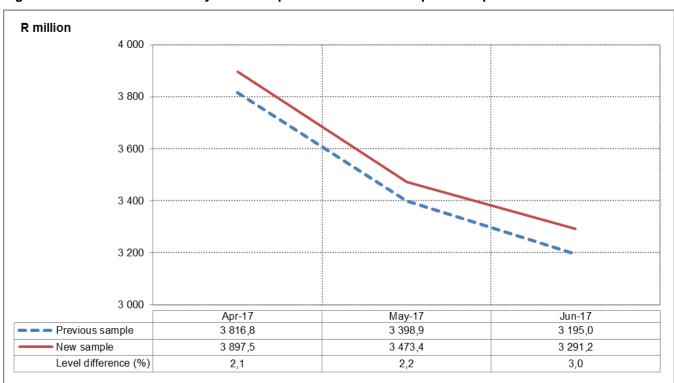

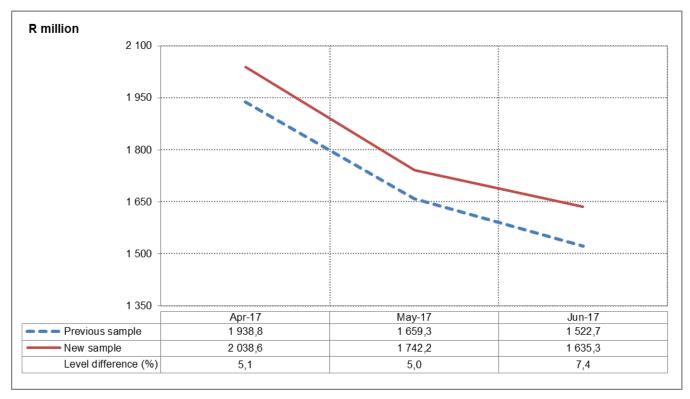
Figure 3 – Total income: monthly levels for previous and new samples for April to June 2017

The reported level of total income for the monthly survey of tourist accommodation for the months April to June 2017 based on the new sample was 2,4% (R251,4 million) higher than the level of total income from the previous sample (see Table D and Figure 3). This is a result of the replacement of the sample which was drawn in April 2016 that was operational for the last half of 2016 and the first half of 2017.

The reported level of income from accommodation for the months April to June 2017 based on the new sample was 5,8% (R295,3 million) higher than the level of income from accommodation from the previous sample (see Table D on page 5 and Figure 4).

The reported level of stay units available for the months April to June 2017 based on the new sample was 12,3% higher than the level of stay units available from the previous sample (see Table D on page 5 and Figure 5).

Figure 5 - Stay units available: monthly levels for previous and new samples for April to June 2017

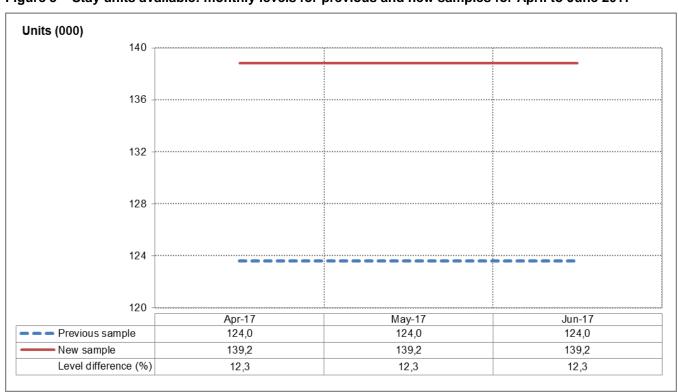

The largest percentage differences were in the following types of accommodation:

- guest-houses and guest-farms (16,6% or R60,8 million higher in the new sample); and
- caravan parks and camping sites (6,6% or R3,7 million lower in the new sample).

Survey information

Introduction

- The results presented in this publication are derived from the monthly survey of the tourist accommodation industry. This survey is based on a sample drawn from the 2017 business sampling frame (BSF) that contains businesses registered for value added tax (VAT).
- In order to improve timeliness, some information for the latest month had to be estimated due to late response. These estimates will be revised in future statistical releases as soon as information becomes available.

Purpose of the survey

3 The Tourist accommodation survey is a monthly survey covering a sample of public and private enterprises involved in the short-stay accommodation industry in South Africa.

The results of the survey are used to compile estimates of the tourism satellite accounts (TSA) and the gross domestic product (GDP) and its components, which are used to develop and monitor government policy. These statistics are also used in the analysis of comparative business and industry performance.

Scope of the survey

- This survey covers the following tax registered private and public enterprises that are mainly engaged in providing short-stay commercial accommodation:
 - Hotels, motels, botels and inns;
 - Caravan parks and camping sites;
 - · Guest-houses and guest-farms; and
 - 'Other' accommodation.

Collection rate

The preliminary collection rate for the tourist accommodation survey for July 2017 was 88,6%. The collection rate for June 2017 for the new sample was 91,4%.

Classification by industry

The 1993 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification of all Economic Activities (SIC), Fifth Edition, Report No. 09-09-02 was used to classify the statistical units in the survey. The SIC is based on the 1990 International Standard Industrial Classification of all Economic Activities (ISIC) with suitable adaptations for local conditions. Each enterprise is classified to an industry, which reflects its predominant activity. Statistics in this publication are presented at 5-digit SIC level.

Statistical unit

7 The statistical units for the collection of the information are enterprises and establishments.

Revised figures

Revised figures are mainly due to late submission of data to Stats SA, or respondents reporting revisions or corrections to their figures. Preliminary figures, as indicated in the relevant tables, are subject to change and when revised will not be indicated as such. Data are edited at the enterprise level.

Rounding-off of figures

9 Where figures have been rounded off, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and the totals.

Comparability with discontinued Hotels' Trading Statistics

The information in this statistical release and the discontinued monthly Hotels' Trading Statistics statistical release is not strictly comparable. The Hotels' Trading Statistics survey was conducted using a list of all hotels graded by the then South African Tourism Board (Satour) when the grading of hotels was still compulsory by law. This survey is conducted from a sample drawn from a business register of all enterprises registered for value added tax (VAT) and income tax.

The higher levels from this survey can be mainly attributed to the following:

- The coverage of all types of tourist accommodation enterprises including hotels;
 and
- The improved coverage of the business register, especially of small and micro enterprises.

Technical notes

Survey methodology and design

1 The survey was conducted by mail, email, fax and telephone.

The 2017 sample of 1 071 enterprises was drawn from a population of 4 164 enterprises using stratified simple random sampling. The enterprises were first stratified at 5-digit level according to the SIC and then by size of enterprises. All large enterprises are completely enumerated. Turnover was used as the measure of size for stratification.

Size groups

The enterprises are divided into four size groups according to turnover. All large and medium enterprises (size group one and two) are completely enumerated. Simple random sampling is applied to size groups three and four (small and very small) enterprises. The total income of the large and medium enterprises (size group one and two) is added to the weighted totals of size groups three and four to reflect the total income.

Sample weighting

For those strata not completely enumerated, the weights to produce estimates are the inverse ratio of the sampling fraction, modified to take account of non-response in the survey. Stratum estimates are calculated and then aggregated with the completely enumerated stratum to form subgroup estimates. These procedures are in line with international best practice.

Reliability of estimates

Data presented in this publication are based on information obtained from a sample and are, therefore, subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if the data had been obtained from all enterprises in the tourist accommodation industry in South Africa.

Relative standard error

One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of enterprises was used. The relative standard error (RSE) provides an immediate indication of the percentage errors likely to have occurred due to sampling, and thus avoids the need to refer to the size of the estimate.

Non-sampling errors

Inaccuracies may occur because of imperfections in reporting by enterprises and errors made in the collection and processing of the data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as non-sampling errors. Every effort is made to minimise non-sampling errors by careful design of questionnaires, testing them in pilot studies, editing reported data and implementing efficient operating procedures. Non-sampling errors occur in both sample surveys and censuses.

Year-on-year percentage change

7 The year-on-year percentage change in a variable for any given period is the change between that period and the corresponding period of the previous year, expressed as a percentage of the latter.

Contribution (percentage points)

The contribution (percentage points) to the year-on-year percentage change for any given period is calculated by multiplying the percentage change of each type of accommodation by its corresponding weight, divided by 100. The weight is the percentage contribution of each type accommodation to the total accommodation income in the corresponding period of the previous year.

Seasonal adjustment

Seasonally adjusted estimates are generated each month using the X-12-ARIMA Seasonal Adjustment Program developed by the US Bureau of the Census. Seasonal adjustment is a means of removing the estimated effects of normal seasonal variation from the series so that the effects of other influences on the series can be recognised more clearly. Seasonal adjustment does not aim to remove irregular or non-seasonal influences which may be present in any particular month. Influences that are volatile or unsystematic can still make it difficult to interpret the movement of the series even after adjustment for seasonal variations. Therefore the month-to-month movements of seasonally adjusted estimates may not be reliable indicators of trend behaviour. Trend cycle

The trend is the long-term pattern or movement of a time series. The X-12-ARIMA Seasonal Adjustment Program is used for smoothing seasonally adjusted estimates to estimates of the underlying trend cycle.

Glossary

Average income per stay unit night sold

Average rate per stay unit (i.e. rate per room in a hotel or powered site in a caravan park) is calculated by dividing the total income from accommodation by the number of stay unit nights sold in the survey period.

Enterprise

An enterprise is a legal unit or combination of legal units that includes and directly controls all functions to carry out its activities.

Establishment

An enterprise or part of an enterprise that is situated in a single location and in which only a single (non-ancillary) productive activity is carried out or in which the principal productive activity accounts for most of the value added.

Income from accommodation

Income from amounts charged for stay units. 'Other' income is excluded (e.g. income from meals).

Income from restaurant and bar sales

Income from meals, banqueting and beverages and tobacco sales.

Other income

Income from casino gambling, laundry and telephone services, rentals and fees

received for transport services, offices, shops, garages, etc.

Occupancy rate

The number of stay unit nights sold, divided by the product of the number of stay units available and the number of days in the survey period, expressed as a percentage.

Other accommodation

Includes lodges, bed-and-breakfast establishments, self-catering establishments and

'other' establishments not elsewhere classified.

Stay unit

The unit of accommodation available to be charged out to guests, for example, a

powered site in a caravan park or a room in a hotel.

Stay unit nights sold

The total number of stay units occupied on each night during the survey period.
