Total income for food and beverages increases for June 2009

The total income generated by the food and beverages industry for June 2009 increased by 0,9% compared with June 2008. The increase was due to income from food sales (2,4% and contributing 2,1 percentage points). This increase was, however, counteracted by decreases in income from bar sales (-9,6% and contributing -0,9 of a percentage point) and other income (-17,8% and contributing -0,4 of a percentage point) (see Table B).

The main contributors to the increase of 0,9% in total income for June 2009 compared with June 2008 were takeaway and fast-food outlets (10,1% and contributing 2,6 percentage points) and caterers (2,6% and contributing 0,5 of a percentage point). However, these increases were counteracted by decreases in restaurants and coffee shops (-2,5% and contributing -1,3 percentage points) and other catering services (-22,0% and contributing -0,9 of a percentage point) (see Table C).

Total income for food and beverages increases during second guarter of 2009

The total income generated by the food and beverages industry for the second guarter of 2009 increased by 1.8% compared with the second quarter of 2008. This was due to the increase in income from food sales (3,4% and contributing 3,0 percentage points). However, there were decreases reported for income from bar sales (-7,4% and contributing -0,7 of a percentage point) and other income (-19,5% and contributing -0,4 of a percentage point) (see Table D).


The 1,8% increase in total income for the second quarter of 2009 compared with the second quarter of 2008 was due to increases reported by takeaway and fast-food outlets (13,3% and contributing 3,4 percentage points) and caterers (7,0% and contributing 1,2 percentage points). However, these increases were counteracted by decreases reported by restaurants and coffee shops (-4,3% and contributing -2,3 percentage points) and other catering services (-15,2% and contributing -0,6 of a percentage point) (see Table E and Figure 1).

Explanatory notes Introduction The results presented in this publication are derived from the monthly survey of the food and beverages industry. This survey is based on a sample drawn from the 2008 Business Sampling Frame (BSF) that contains businesses registered for value added tax (VAT). Purpose of the survey The food and beverages survey is a monthly survey covering a sample of public and private enterprises involved in the preparation of meals and drinks for immediate consumption in South Africa. The purpose of this survey is to monitor trends in the food and beverages industry. The results of the survey are used to compile estimates of the Tourism Satellite Accounts (TSA) and the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and its components, which are used to develop and monitor government policy. These statistics are also used in the analysis of comparative business and industry performance. The results of this monthly survey are published monthly in this statistical release P6420: Food and beverages. Scope of the survey This survey covers the following tax registered private and public enterprises that are mainly engaged in providing food and beverages for immediate consumption: Restaurants and coffee shops; Takeaway and fast-food outlets: • Caterers; and . Other catering services. The preliminary response rate for the 'Food and beverages' survey for June 2009 was **Response rate** 93,5%. The improved response rate for May 2009 was 95,0%. The 1993 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification of all Economic Activities (SIC), **Classification by** industry Fifth Edition, Report No. 09-09-02, was used to classify the statistical units in the survey. The SIC is based on the 1990 International Standard Industrial Classification of all Economic Activities (ISIC) with suitable adaptations for local conditions. Statistics in this publication are presented at 5-digit SIC level. Each enterprise is classified to an industry, which reflects its predominant activity. Size groups The enterprises are divided into four size groups according to turnover. Large enterprises are enterprises with an annual turnover of R13 million and more. The Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) cut-off points defining the size groups, namely large, medium, small and micro enterprises, are given in Table F. tology The survey was conducted by mail, fax and telephone.

A sample of approximately 900 enterprises was drawn using stratified simple random sampling. The enterprises were first stratified at 5-digit level according to the SIC and then by size of enterprises. Large enterprises are completely enumerated. Turnover was used as the measure of size.

Relative standard error Data presented in this publication are based on information obtained from a sample and are, therefore, subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if the data had been obtained from all enterprises in the food and beverages industry in South Africa.

One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of enterprises was used. The relative standard error (RSE) provides an immediate indication of the percentage errors likely to have occurred due to sampling, and thus avoids the need to refer to the size of the estimate.

- **Non-sampling errors** Inaccuracies may occur because of imperfections in reporting by enterprises and errors made in the collection and processing of the data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as non-sampling errors. Every effort is made to minimise non-sampling errors by careful design of questionnaires, testing them in pilot studies, editing reported data and implementing efficient operating procedures. Non-sampling errors occur in both sample surveys and censuses.
- **Revised figures** Revised figures are due to respondents reporting revisions or corrections to their figures and late submission of their data to Stats SA. Preliminary figures are indicated in the relevant tables. Data are edited at the enterprise level.

Seasonal adjustment Seasonally adjusted estimates will not be published until there are sufficient data points for the new survey. As soon as sufficient data points are available, Stats SA will consider publishing seasonally adjusted estimates.

Glossary Caterers Enterprises involved in the sale and supply of meals and drinks prepared on the premises on a contract basis and brought to other premises chosen by the person ordering it, to be served for immediate consumption to guests or customers. A legal unit or a combination of legal units that includes and directly controls all Enterprise functions necessary to carry out its activities. Income from bar sales Refers to income from liquor sales. Income from food sales Refers to income from the sale of meals and non-alcoholic drinks. Industry It is a group of enterprises engaged in the same or similar kinds of economic activity. Industries are defined in the System of National Accounts (SNA) in the same way as in the Standard Industrial Classification of all Economic Activities, Fifth Edition; Report No. 09-09-02 of April 1993 (SIC). Other catering services Includes bars, taverns, other drinking places, ice-cream parlours, etc. Other income Includes all income not earned from food sales or bar sales. **Restaurants and coffee** Enterprises involved in the sale and provision of meals and drinks, ordered from a menu, prepared on the premises for immediate consumption and with provided seating. shops **Total income** Includes income from food sales, income from bar sales and other income. Takeaway and fast-food Enterprises involved in the sale and provision of meals and drinks, ordered from a outlets menu, prepared on the premises for takeaway purposes in a packaged format (not on plates), at a stand or in a location, with or without provided seating.

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
