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Preface

Since 1987 Statistics South Africa (Stats SA) conducts the Manpower survey on an annual basis. This survey is an enterprise (firm) based survey covering private and public enterprises in the formal non-agricultural business sector. The survey provides key statistics regarding trends in employment according to occupational groups. The information is based on a sample survey. The results of the sample survey are raised to the universe and represent all occupations in the formal non-agricultural business sector.

This report contains the results of the 1995 Manpower survey and provides detailed information regarding occupations for the Republic of South Africa, excluding the former TBVC states. The report also contains information regarding the total number of employees and vacancies of enterprises according to major occupational groups, major industrial groups, selected industrial groups and individual occupations. Detailed information on occupations in each major division of the Standard Industrial Classification of all Economic Activities is available on request.

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Interpretative summary

Introduction

Since 1987 Statistics South Africa (Stats SA) conducts the Manpower survey on an annual basis. This survey is an enterprise based annual survey covering private and public enterprises in the formal non-agricultural business sector. Employees in the informal sector as well as employees in the agricultural and fishing industry and domestic and garden workers employed by private households are excluded from this survey. The survey provides key statistics regarding trends in employment according to occupational groups. The information is based on a sample survey. The results of the sample survey are raised to the universe and represent all occupations in the formal non-agricultural business sector.

This 1995 Manpower survey covers only those persons employed by an enterprise. Therefore, the information is not representative of the economically active population firstly due to the agricultural, hunting and fishing industry, private households and the informal business sector which are excluded from the survey and secondly due to the exclusion of the unemployed (which together with the employed population constitutes the economically active population). Although the employees in the agricultural, hunting and fishing industry and private households are not covered in the Manpower survey, occupations such as forester or seed grower which belong in the agricultural industry are sometimes included, as the survey collects information from enterprises regarding their main economic activity. A particular enterprise whose main industrial activity is manufacturing may for example include an establishment (branch) whose main activity is farming or fishing and may therefore include agricultural employees or fishermen.

Total employment

According to the 1995 Manpower survey, 5 487 422 people were employed at 31 March 1995 in the formal non-agricultural business sector (excluding private households). Employment, as reflected by the results of the 1995 Manpower survey, increased by 1,7% compared with the results of the 1994 Manpower Survey.


It should be noted that these results are not strictly comparable with the results of the Survey of Total Employment and Earnings (STEE) as published quarterly in the statistical release P0271. The Manpower survey collects information from enterprises in all industrial groups. Therefore, an enterprise may have one or more establishments which may operate in different industries, e.g. mining and quarrying, manufacturing, agriculture and fishing. In this report the enterprises are classified according to their main economic activity. The STEE collects information from enterprises in the construction, wholesale trade, retail trade and motor trade, transport, storage and communication, financial institutions and community, social and personal services industries while in the manufacturing and hotels industries, information is collected from establishments.

Distribution of total employment according to population group

5 487 422 employed persons according to population group in 1995 was 2 788 937 (50,8%) African/Black (5,9%) White employees, 623 775 (11,4%) Coloured employees, 237 463 (4,3%) Indian/Asian employees and 418 for which the population group was not specified. The category "unspecified" is the result of certain respondents for or population group of their employees. The total employment according to population group as reported by the Manpower survey, reflected major changes when compared with the 1994 Manpower survey. Of the four major population groups in the 1995 Manpower survey only the African/Black group reflected an increase in employment in comparison to their respective figures. Employment of Africans/Blacks for example increased by 2,4%, while employment of Indians/Asians and of Whites decreased by 4,4% and of Coloureds decreased by 2,8% (cf. figure 1).

Figure 1 - Employment according to population group: 1993, 1994 and 1995




Distribution of total employment according to gender and population group

Employment according to gender in 1995 as reported through the 1995 Manpower survey reflected major changes compared to the 1994 manpower survey. At 1995, males represented 62,2% (3 413 590) of all employees, females represented 30,2% (1 655 418) of all employees while no gender was specified for 7,6% (418 414) of all employees. The employment of females increased by 1,1% at March 1995 compared with March 1994, while the employment of males decreased by 1,4% during the same period. The increase in female employment is due to an increase in the employment in the African/Black group, while all other groups reflected drops in employment levels. A similar tendency was observed for male employment. The employment for example of African/Black females increased by 4,6% and African/Black males increased by 1,8% while the employment of Indian/Asian males decreased by 8,6%, White males decreased by 7,3%, Coloured females decreased by 3,5%, Coloured males decreased by 2,3%, Indian/Asian females decreased by 0,9% and White females decreased by 0,2% (cf. figure 2).

Major occupational groups reflecting highest increases in employment

The services occupational group, representing 14,2% of the total number of employees at March 1995, reflected an increase of 15,6% in employment at March 1995 compared with March 1994 and an increase of 12,3% compared with March 1993. The managerial, executive and administrative occupational group, representing 4,2% of the total number of employees at March 1995, reflected an increase of 4,5% in employment at March 1995 compared with March 1994 and an increase of 8,9% compared with March 1993. The production foreman and supervisor, miner and quarry worker occupational group, representing 6,9% of the total number of employees at March 1995, reflected an increase of 3,0% at March 1995 compared with March 1994 and a decrease of 2,7% compared with March 1993.

Major occupational groups reflecting highest decreases in employment

The operator, production and related semi-skilled worker occupational group, representing 15,7% of the total number of employees at March 1995, reflected a decrease of 4,3% in employment at March 1995 compared with March 1994 and a decrease of 9,5% compared with March 1993. The artisan, apprentice and related occupational group, representing 5,0% of the total number of employees at March 1995 reflected a decrease of 2,6% in employment at March 1995 compared with March 1994 and a decrease of 6,9% compared with March 1993.

Detailed occupations reflecting increases in employment according to major occupational groups

The professional, semi-professional and technical major occupational group reflected significant increases in employment in certain detailed occupations at March 1995 compared with March 1994. Employment in medical and related sciences technicians occupations not elsewhere classified increased by 344,8% (processing code 144) at March 1995 compared with March 1994. Employment in accountant

and related accounting occupations not elsewhere classified increased by 22,8% (processing code 190) and employment in education and related occupations increased by 6,8% (processing code 158) during the above-mentioned period. These increases were mainly due to new appointments and restructuring of businesses/organisations.

The managerial, executive and administrative major occupational group reflected large increases in certain detailed occupations at March 1995 compared with March 1994. Employment in retail services occupations increased by 22,3% (processing code 263), employment in catering services occupations increased by 19,7% (processing code 267) and employment in managerial occupations, excluding the government sector, increased by 7,6% (processing code 244) at March 1995 compared with March 1994. These increases were mainly due to new appointments and restructuring of businesses/organisations.

The clerical and sales major occupational group reflected large increases in employment in certain detailed occupations at March 1995 compared with March 1994. Employment in financial clerk not elsewhere classified occupations increased by 166,0% (processing code 295), employment in cashier (shop) occupations increased by 21,0% (processing code 298), employment in secretary, typist, information and related clerk occupations increased by 16,2% (processing code 303), employment in clerical supervisor and administrative official occupations increased by 12,8% (processing code 278), employment in clerk (general) occupations increased by 7,3% (processing code 286) and employment in sales worker, shop assistant occupations increased by 5,8% (processing code 322) at March 1995 compared with March 1994. These increases were mainly due to new post descriptions resulting from restructuring of businesses/organisations, new appointments and business expansions.

The transport, delivery and communication major occupational group reflected large increases in certain detailed occupations at March 1995 compared with March 1994. Employment in postal sorter occupations increased by 258,9% (processing code 366) at March 1995 compared with March 1994. Furthermore, employment in telecommunication occupations not elsewhere classified increased by 90,9% (processing code 373), employment in train driver occupations increased by 54,4% (processing code 351) and employment in truck driver occupations increased by 8,9% (processing code 346) during the above-mentioned period. These increases were mainly due to employees appointed into new post descriptions and through the process of restructuring of businesses/organisations.

The services major occupational group reflected extremely high increases in employment in certain detailed occupations at March 1995 compared with March 1994. Employment in catering services occupations increased by 113,3% (processing code 388), employment in services worker not elsewhere classified occupations increased by 107,8% (processing code 418), employment in kitchen worker, pantry, tea servant occupations increased by 92,8% (processing code 392) and employment in the law enforcement and related services occupations increased by 18,7% (processing code 376) at March 1995 compared to March 1994. These increases were mainly due to the expansion of businesses, reclassification of posts and new appointments. The increase of 117,1% in members of permanent force occupations not elsewhere classified (processing code 374), was mainly due to the inclusion of military personnel in the South African Defence Force from the former TBVC states, Mkhonto We Sizwe (MK) and Azanian People's Liberation Army (APLA) members during 1995.

The professional, semi-professional and technical major occupational group reflected large decreases in certain detailed occupations at March 1995 compared with March 1994. Employment in artist, performing arts and related occupations decreased by 88,1% (processing code 217), employment in education and related occupations decreased by 23,4% (processing code 154) and employment in accountant and related accounting occupations decreased by 17,0% (processing code 189) at March 1995 compared with March 1994. These decreases were mainly due to the termination of temporary employee contracts, retrenchments and restructuring of businesses/organisations.

Detailed occupations reflecting decreases in employment according to major occupational groups

The clerical and sales major occupational group reflected large decreases in employment in certain detailed occupations at March 1995 compared with March 1994. Employment in sales worker: insurance, property, services occupations decreased by 12,6% (processing code 328), employment in secretary, typist, information and related clerk occupations decreased by 7,1% (processing code 301), employment in clerk (general) occupations decreased by 6,3% (processing code 285) and employment in sales worker, shop assistant occupations decreased by 5,3% (processing code 323) at March 1995 compared with March 1994. These decreases were mainly due to new job classifications, retrenchments, resignations and restructuring of businesses/organisations.

The transport, delivery and communication major occupational group reflected large decreases in certain detailed occupations at March 1995 compared with March 1994. Employment in communication occupations for mail distributions decreased by 75,1% (processing code 367), employment in mail distribution occupations, not elsewhere classified decreased by 47,3% (processing code 369) and employment in rail transport occupations decreased by 16,7% (processing code 355) at March 1995 compared to March 1994. These decreases were mainly due to restructuring of businesses/organisations.

The services major occupational group reflected large decreases in employment in certain detailed occupations at March 1995 compared with March 1994. Employment in services workers, not elsewhere classified in businesses, hotels, etc. occupations decreased by 38,6% (processing code 414) and employment in services workers not elsewhere classified in the charworker occupations decreased by 3,9% (processing code 415) at March 1995 compared to March 1994. These decreases were mainly due to retrenchments of employees, implementing of new systems and reclassification of post descriptions.

The production foreman, supervisor, miner and quarry worker, operator, production and related semi-skilled worker and the labourer major occupational group reflected decreases in employment in certain detailed occupations at March 1995 compared with March 1994. Employment in building and construction occupations decreased by 69,1% (processing code 531), employment in food, beverages and tobacco preparation and manufacturing occupations decreased by 56,3% (processing code 465), employment in crane, stationary engine and related operator occupations decreased by 20,4% (processing code 536) and employment in mining worker not elsewhere classified occupations decreased by 16,6% (processing code 455) at March 1995 compared with March 1994. These decreases were mainly due to the abolishment of posts, closure of firms, resignation of some employees and implementation of new technology.


Distribution of total employment according to population group within major occupational groups that reflected major changes in employment

The distribution of employees according to population group within the services major occupational group reflected major changes according to the 1995 Manpower survey compared with the 1994 Manpower survey. The number of African/Black male employees in this occupational group increased by 45,4% at March 1995 compared with March 1994, while the number of Coloured male employees increased by 7,9%, the number of African/Black female employees increased by 6,0% and the number of White female employees increased by 1,0%. However, the number of White male employees decreased by 31,8%, the number of Indian/Asian female employees decreased by 13,8%, the number of Indian/Asian male employees decreased by 8,6% and the number of Coloured female employees decreased by 2,3% during the above-mentioned period.

The distribution of employees according to population group within the managerial, executive and administrative major occupational group reflected major changes according to the 1995 Manpower survey compared with the 1994 Manpower survey. While employment levels of White males and Indian/Asian males and females decreased, employment levels for all other population groups increased. So for example did employment levels of African/Black females increased by 57,9% in this occupational group, while employment of Coloured females increased by 27,0%, employment of African/Black males increased by 13,7%, employment of White females increased by 8,6% and employment of Coloured males increased by 5,4% at March 1995 compared with March 1994. However, employment of Indian/Asian females decreased by 12,7%, employment of Indian/Asian males decreased by 4,6% and employment of White males decreased by 1,9% during the above-mentioned period (cf. figure 3).

The distribution of employees according to population group within the production foreman and supervisor, miner and quarry worker major occupational group reflected major changes according to the 1995 Manpower survey compared with the 1994 Manpower survey. The number of White female employees in the production foreman and supervisor, miner and quarry worker occupational group increased by 12,4%, the number of Coloured male employees increased by 2,7%, the number of African/Black male employees increased by 0,5%, the number of Indian/Asian male employees increased by 0,1% at March 1995 compared with March 1994. However, the number of Indian/Asian female employees in the production foreman and supervisor, miner and quarry worker occupational group decreased by 19,4%, the number of African/Black female employees decreased by 11,0%, the number of White male employees decreased by 3,7% and the number of Coloured female employees decreased by 2,3% during the above-mentioned period.

Figure 3 - Employment in the managerial occupational group according to gender and population group: 1993, 1994 and 1995




Distribution of total employment according to major industrial group

The community, social and personal services industry was the largest contributor (27,1%) to total formal employment at March 1995,

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followed by the manufacturing industry (24,1%), the wholesale, retail and motor trade and catering and accommodation services industry (18,6%), the mining and quarrying industry (10,1%), the financial industry (8,1%), the construction industry (5,6%), the transport industry (5,6%), the electricity, gas and water supply industry (0,8%) and the fishing industry (0,1%) (cf. figure 4).

Major industrial groups reflecting decreases in employment

The industries that reflected an increase in employment at March 1995 compared with March 1994 were the wholesale, retail and motor trade and catering and accommodation service industry (+10,2%), the fishing industry (+7,1%), the mining and quarrying industry (+5,9%), the financial industry (+5,1%) and the community, social and personal services industry (+2,3%).

Major occupational groups with the highest vacancy rate

The industries that reflected a decrease in employment at March 1995 compared with March 1994 were the transport, storage and communication industry (-7,3%), the manufacturing industry (-3,9%), the construction industry (-3,2%) and the electricity, gas and

water supply industry (-1,1%).

Both the professional, semi-professional and technical major occupational group and the transport, storage and communication major occupational group reflected the highest vacancy rate of 4,1% at March 1995.

The annual October Household Survey (OHS) also collects information on employment in South Africa. The results for the 1995 OHS was published on 27 November 1996 in the statistical release P0317. Care should be taken when comparing the results of the Manpower survey with the results of the annual OHS as different sample designs and survey methodologies are used.

The OHS collects information regarding the employment status of adults by visiting a probability sample of households in South Africa. The Manpower survey collects information from a sample of businesses from the formal non-agricultural business sector. Currently the Manpower survey does not collect information from the agriculture, hunting and forestry industry, household services and the informal sector.

The main purpose of the OHS is to obtain indicators on the size of the economically active population in South Africa with special reference to the number of unemployed persons. Employees from both the formal and informal business sectors are covered by the OHS, since they are reached by interviews in households, not businesses.

According to the results of the March 1995 Survey of Total Employment and Earnings (STEE), the total number of employees at that time was 5,2 million. The STEE covers only the formal non-agricultural business sector. The total number of employees in the formal non-agricultural business sector as reflected by Manpower survey at April 1995, was 5,4 million. The difference of 0,2 million employees is mainly due to some sectors in the financial industry as well as business and personal services industries not covered by STEE.
