## National government financial transfers: Who benefits the most?


One of the important tasks of national government is to redistribute funds, mainly received from taxes, to other sectors of the economy.

Almost R72 of every R100 of national government spending was in the form of financial transfers to households, public corporations, organisations and other levels of government.

Provincial government was the main beneficiary, receiving nearly half of financial transfers in 2021/22. This is not surprising, given that provincial government is primarily responsible for administrating the country's massive public education and healthcare systems.

Households were the second biggest beneficiary, with social benefits accounting for R231 billion. Social benefits mainly include social grants.


#### Building plans: Gauteng leads

Only by a small margin. Gauteng recorded the highest value of building plans passed in 2022, contributing 31,5% (R37,02 billion) to the national total of R117,49 billion.

Western Cape was not far behind, accounting for R36,99 billion. In third place was KwaZulu-Natal, followed by Eastern Cape.

Stats SA's annual release of its Selected building statistics of the private sector report provides a detailed breakdown of building plans passed and buildings completed, as reported by metropolitan municipalities and large local municipalities. Data are not only available for provinces, but also for municipalities.


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
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
